# Background on reporting under the Water Convention




 Reporting mechanism introduced in 2015, with Decision VII/2 by 7th Meeting of Parties

Coincided with SDGs: for Parties, reporting under the Convention and SDG 6.5.2 is combined to increase synergies and avoid duplication of efforts

- Transparent means by which to:
- o assess implementation
- identify gaps and difficulties
- highlight good practice and lessons learned
- Support future implementation by helping to focus efforts on key challenges
- Secretariat requested to prepare synthesis report based on national reports submitted








# Initial results from the 3<sup>rd</sup> reporting under the Water Convention

- ✓ All Parties responded in 2023 (2020: 100%; 2017: 95%)
- ✓ Coordination improved: Many Parties have engaged in consultations on the content of their reports at national level and with riparian countries and/or joint body
- ✓ Average value of the SDG indicator 6.5.2 for Water Convention Parties is 81% (global average 59%)
- ✓ 22 out of 26 countries worldwide with 100% value are Water Convention Parties
- ✓ Improved data on areas and many additional small basins reported in the 3rd cycle


- Norway, Sweden: Agreement on cooperation 2021-2027 between the Swedish Agency for Marine and Water Management (Sweden) and the Environment Directorate (Norway) on water management in accordance with EU WFD (2020)
- Albania, North Macedonia: Agreement on international water way transport in Ohrid Lake (2022)
- Hungary-Serbia-Croatia: Trilateral cooperation agreement on ice control in the section of the Danube River of common interest between Dunafoldvar (rkm 1560) and Vukovar (rkm 1333) (2019)
- Moldova, Romania and Ukraine: (ministerial) Declaration on cooperation on the management of the Prut river basin (2023)
- Poland, Ukraine: MoU in the field of Geology and Mineral Resources between the Polish Geological Institute-National Research Institute and the State Geology and Subsoil Service of Ukraine (2022)
- Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan: Inter-agency Roadmap on Protection and Sustainable Use of the Pre-Tashkent Transboundary Aquifer (2022)
- Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan: Agreement between the Government of Turkmenistan and the Government of the Republic of Uzbekistan on management, protection and rational use of water resources of the Amu Darya River (2022)



- Plan of approach for exceptional low water events in the Meuse basin (2020)
- Strategic Action Programme on the Dniester (2021)

- ✓ Need to strengthen/establish cooperative arrangements for transboundary waters
- ✓ Differences between national administrative and legal frameworks
- ✓ Resource constraints
- ✓ Lack of relevant data and information


