The fieldwork for this survey was done on behalf of the BiB by a commercial German opinion research institute in the summer of 1992. In total, 10,012 German men and women, aged 20 to 39 years (born between 1952 and 1972), were interviewed. In order to obtain a sample that allows for comparative analysis between East- and West German men and women, the sample was stratified into four subgroups: (1) males in the former FRG 20 %, (2) females in the former FRG 30 %, (3) males in the former GDR 20 %, (4) females in the former GDR 30 %.
