

Introduction

Pursuant to Article 10, paragraph 2, of the Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters (Aarhus Convention) and Decision I/8 adopted by the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention, requiring the continuous review of the implementation of the Convention on the basis of regular reporting by the Parties, the Parties to the Aarhus Convention produce and make publicly available National Implementation Reports. The revised format for the Aarhus Convention implementation report was endorsed through decision IV/4 adopted by the Meeting of the Parties to the Aarhus Convention at its fourth session (Chisinau, 29 June – 1 July 2011).

The Aarhus Convention secretariat has developed an online tool to facilitate the Parties in preparing and uploading their reports. Parties are strongly encouraged to upload their National Implementation Reports in all official ECE languages (ENG/FRE/RUS).

Article 4, paragraph 1	
17. The Convention's requirements have been reflected in the Constitution of the Republic of Albania, rendering them in constitutional articles. In addition, the Law for the Right to Information on Official Documents, and the Law for People's Ombudsman were approved. Public information and its participation in decision-making have also been treated within the Administrative Procedures Code, the Law for Organization and Functioning of Local Governance and the Law for Civic Emergencies. In all these legal acts, the right for information is ensured without an interest having to be stated. The time limit for answering the request for information is stated in the Law for the Right to Information on Official Documents and is 40 days after receiving the request. The answers to these requests have been immediate, as the number of written requests has been low. The most important percentage of the requests is individuals making requests in person to the Information and Communication Department (6-7 persons each day) of the MoE and taking any kind of material, according to the needs. Another form of information is the environmental publication of the MOE <i>Electronic Environmental Bulletin</i> (a monthly), which communicates the most important decisions and activities of the Ministry. The website of the Ministry is always available to the public Article 4, paragraph 2

1 PROCÉDURE D'ÉLABORATION DU PRESENT RAPPORT

L'Année: 2005

Plusieurs autorités sont responsables de l'exécution de la Convention, à savoir l'Autorité fédérale et les trois entités fédérées (Région wallonne, Région de Bruxelles-Capitale et Région flamande). Chaque autorité a donc répondu au niveau national aux questions relevant de sa propre compétence. Par suite, le rapport national officiel de la Belgique est composé en fait de quatre rapports différents. Afin de respecter la limite de 8 500 mots fixés par l'ONU, le présent document a été établi comme synthèse des quatre rapports. La Belgique ne le considère donc pas comme son rapport officiel, mais comme le reflet des points principaux des rapports officiels. Pour faciliter la compréhension du rapport national, des hyperliens avec les réponses complètes ont été inclus pour chaque question.

Le rapport national a été coordonné par le réseau Aarhus, qui dépend du Comité pour la politique internationale de l'environnement, lequel rassemble les autorités politiques et administratives compétentes sur les questions d'environnement. Le réseau Aarhus est chargé de préparer et suivre les négociations internationales relatives à la Convention. Il a coordonné les préparatifs des consultations nationales afin d'assurer une harmonisation à l'échelle du pays. Il a décidé de tenir deux types de consultations, à savoir une consultation nationale coordonnée des quatre grandes fédérations belges de protection de l'environnement (qui couvre donc l'ensemble des rapports belges) et une consultation du public par chaque autorité pour son propre rapport.

Les fédérations d'ONG ont présenté des observations communes sur le rapport fédéral et des observations individuelles sur les rapports régionaux. Comme ces observations n'ont pas de lien direct avec le processus de présentation des rapports, mais sont davantage axées sur des questions générales (par exemple, les améliorations qui peuvent être apportées à l'accès à la justice, compte tenu de la jurisprudence restrictive), on peut y accéder par l'hyperlien fédéral pour le rapport fédéral et par les hyperliens régionaux pour les rapports régionaux.

S'agissant du public, chaque autorité a organisé une consultation en ligne au cours du mois de novembre 2004. Très peu d'observations ont été reçues, mais chaque autorité a répondu aux membres du public, soit individuellement, soit de manière générale sur le site Web.

L'Année: 2011

La Convention sur l'accès à l'information, la participation au processus décisionnel et l'accès à la justice en matière d'environnement est une convention « mixte » au niveau belge, c'est-à-dire que sa mise en oeuvre dépend de plusieurs autorités. In concreto, il s'agit de l'autorité fédérale et de trois entités fédérées (Région wallonne, Région de Bruxelles-Capitale et Communauté flamande). Chaque autorité a donc répondu en interne au présent rapport pour ce qui relève de ses compétences. C'est ainsi que le rapport national de la Belgique est constitué de quatre rapports distincts.

Etant donné que certaines compétences restent nationales et donc, sont gérées par l'autorité fédérale, les rapports régionaux peuvent renvoyer sur certains points au rapport fédéral (particulièrement en ce qui concerne l'aspect juridictionnel de l'accès à la justice). A l'inverse, certaines compétences sont exclusivement régionales. Dans ce cas, le rapport fédéral le mentionne expressément.

La coordination du rapport national s'est faite dans le cadre du réseau Aarhus qui appartient au Comité pour la Politique internationale de l'Environnement (C.C.P.I.E), lequel est un comité qui rassemble les autorités politiques et administratives compétentes au niveau belge en matière d'environnement. 2 PARTICULAR CIRCUMSTANCES RELEVANT FOR UNDERSTANDING THE REPORT

3. This is the second report for Albania, and the institution responsible for implementation of the Convention is the Ministry of Environment (MoE), including its structures in the Prefectures (Regional Environmental Agencies). Lack of funds from the State budget makes the implementation of the Convention difficult, especially on issues that directly affect the general public and/or the interested part of civil society.



Armenia

Year: 2008

6. Armenia is still, although to a lesser extent, facing financial difficulties related to the implementation of the Convention: there is a lack of computers and photocopy machines; not enough has been done to educate officials on the Convention's provisions; progress in incorporating the provisions into national legislation is slow; there is a lack of specialists in this field; and there are other obstacles to implementation. All these obstacles are particularly acute at the regional level.

7. According to the Constitution, executive power is exercised by the Government, which is responsible for implementation of State policies on science, education, culture, health, social security and environmental protection (art. 89). International agreements concluded on behalf of Armenia are applied only after ratification. Ratified international agreements are a composite part of the judicial system of Armenia. If such agreements establish rules different from those envisaged by the country's laws, the rules of the international agreements shall prevail. The Constitution has supreme juridical force and its rules are directly applicable (article 6 of the Constitution). As stated in article 10 of the Constitution, "The State shall ensure the protection and regeneration of the environment and the sound use of natural resources".

Year: 2011

1. Armenia is a unitary state. Under article 62 of the Constitution, "Legislative power in the Republic of Armenia shall be exercised by the National Assembly." The Armenian Government holds executive power. Under article 89 of the Constitution, "The Government shall implement state policy in the fields of science, education, culture, health care, social welfare and environmental protection."

2. The Armenian legal system has three levels. Under paragraph 1 of article 91 of the Constitution, "Justice in the Republic of Armenia shall be administered solely by the courts in accordance with the Constitution and laws." Article 92 of the Constitution states that the courts operating in the Republic of Armenia are the first instance court of general jurisdiction, the Court of Appeal and the Court of Cassation, which ensures uniformity in the application of the law. It is forbidden to establish emergency tribunals. One special administrative court and one special administrative appeal court are currently operational in Armenia. Under article 93 of the Constitution, "Constitutional justice in the Republic of Armenia shall be administered by the Constitutional Court." Under article 6 of the Constitution, "The Constitution of the Republic has shall have supreme legal force and the norms thereof shall apply directly... International treaties shall come into force only after being ratified or approved. International treaties are a constituent part of the legal system of the Republic of Armenia. If a ratified international treaty stipulates norms other than those stipulated in





Figure 10 Aarhus Clearinghouse webpage






