Plans for the nexus assessment in a transboundary context under the Water Convention

Background

- In 2003 the Parties to the Water Convention decided to regularly carry out regional assessments; First Assessment in 2007, Second Assessment in 2011 — key documents to the Environment for Europe Ministerial Conferences
- Among the findings of the Second Assessment: Policy integration and coherence remains weak across the region; difficult to put into practice, painful trade offs -> assess the situation, review experience, identify solutions
- Water, energy and food sectors strongly interlinked > impacts & trade-offs, also potential synergies very topical but little done at transboundary level



What does the nexus entail in the transboundary context?

- Finding a balance between various uses and protection of the resource: address and reduce trade offs and increase synergies
- Needed:
 - Increased understanding and dialogue
 - Effective institutions and legal frameworks
 - Decision-support tools (monitoring, impact assessment etc.)
 - Regulations / economic tools
 - Sharing / solidarity/political willingness



Selected basins to be assessed: the call for proposals is out

- Cases sought where a nexus approach to basin management could contribute to long-term sustainability and better management of resources
- A representative set of basins aimed at: all UNECE subregions to be covered, N-S, E-W
- With the opening of the Convention, including basins from other regions valuable for exchange of experience
- Basins to reflect, ideally,
 - different transboundary relationships and level of socio-economic development
 - A diversity of issues, different angles to the nexus
 - Climatic zones i.e. different level of water availability
 - Varying relative resource scarcity and productivity
 - A adequate level of data availability a common minimum level to be established, but room to be left for more ambition Convention of the Protection and Use of Transboundary Watercourses and International Lakes



Process considerations

- Process as important as final product for capacity building & exchange of experience
- Broad expertise and information needed How do we ensure the necessary intersectoral coordination?
- Potential synergy with other areas of the work plan, other initiatives?
- Strategic partners? Relevant work done by others already?



Organization and the time line

- The supervising group: a Nexus Task Force to cover for WGMA in 2013-2015
- Exchanges with potential partners & identification of methodological expertise on-going
- Interest among countries & commissions being explored with a call for proposals for basins to be assessed; deadline 31 January 2013
- Expert workshop on 8-9 April 2013 to discuss and refine the methodology
- A list of indicative data requirements to be defined
- Information collection, identify complementary information sources
- Approach to be tested on a pilot basin
- 2013-2014 basin level process (inter-sectoral basin level meetings: concerned sectors and main water users to participate) & assessments
