Draft programme of work of the Economic Cooperation and Integration subprogramme for 2020

Note by the Secretariat

I. Introduction

1. The present document sets out the draft programme of work of the Economic Cooperation and Integration subprogramme (“the subprogramme”) for 2020. The Committee on Innovation, Competitiveness and Public-Private Partnerships (“the Committee”) is invited to adopt it and recommend to the Executive Committee (Excom) for approval. Any subsequent additional, discontinued or carried over outputs will be reflected in Umoja used by the Secretariat for planning, monitoring and reporting on the implementation of the programme.

2. The draft programme of work applies a results-based management (RBM) approach, a broad management approach which establishes logical relationship between the hierarchical results (deliverables – objectives – impact) known as ‘results chain’, the resources (human and financial) known as ‘inputs’ and the external factors (strategic, governance, operational, financial) which can prevent from achieving the objective.

3. The objective, the most significant planned result and the deliverables in the draft programme of work correspond to those contained in the ECE proposed programme budget for 2020. The objective of the subprogramme is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In attaining its objective, the subprogramme builds on cross-sectoral collaboration with other subprogrammes in relevant ECE nexus areas where multiple SDGs converge.¹ This type of collaboration enables the subprogramme to maximize existing

synergies, increase the efficiency of its work and have a multiplying effect on the impact of its actions to support countries to implement SDGs. The deliverables of the subprogramme fall into the following main categories: (a) facilitation of the intergovernmental process and expert groups; (b) generation and transfer of knowledge, including technical cooperation projects, training events, seminars, workshops, and publications; (c) other substantive deliverables, and (d) communication deliverables.

4. The details of the proposed publications are provided in Annex I. The overall ECE legislative mandates and those specific for the subprogramme are listed in Annex II.

II. Objective and alignment with SDGs

5. The objective of the subprogramme is to strengthen innovation, competitiveness and Public-Private Partnerships policies in the ECE region.

6. The responsibility for the subprogramme is vested in the Economic Cooperation and Trade Division.

7. The objective of the subprogramme is aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 8, which is to promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all. The objective is also aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 9, which is to build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization, and foster innovation. The objective is also aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 12, which is to ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns. Furthermore, the objective is also aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 17, which is to strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development.

III. Highlighted planned result for 2020


8. The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development identifies science, technology and innovation as key means of implementation. Promoting innovation is also part of Sustainable Development Goal 9. There are a number of existing efforts to measure innovation in a comparative perspective, including the Global Innovation Index and the Global Competitiveness Index.

9. One finding that emerges clearly from these efforts is that countries differ significantly not only in how many resources they put into innovation, and on how much innovation they are able to generate, but also in how effective they are in translating innovation inputs (i.e. spending) into innovation outputs (i.e. new products and services). Much of this variance comes down to differences in government policies. Policies have a key role to play in encouraging investments in innovation, in steering these investments into areas critical for sustainable development, and in ensuring that investments generate a high social return.

10. In response for 2020, to expand the evidence base for improving such policies, ECE will pilot an Innovation Policy Index with a set of interested member States. The index will allow the subprogramme to analyze in a comparative perspective the innovation policies of different countries, to identify which policies are effective, and to recommend policy improvements to our member States on this basis.

11. The expected result would be a stronger evidence base for providing advice on innovation policy, and more relevant policy recommendations on innovation for sustainable development. The expected result would be evidenced by the number of new policy recommendations on innovation for sustainable development implemented by member States, as shown in the figure below.



12. The result, if achieved, will demonstrate progress made in 2020 towards the collective attainment of the objective of the subprogramme. It will contribute to the nexus areas on sustainable use of natural resources, and measuring and monitoring SDGs implementation.

IV. External factors

13. The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objective on the assumption that: (a) there is active participation and contribution by experts from Governments, academia and the private sector to expert group meetings and networks; (b) Governments are willing to engage in policy dialogue and take measures to implement policy recommendations and standards; and (c) extrabudgetary resources for capacity-building, advisory services and field projects are adequate.
