### **INTRODUCTION**

1. The present Annual Report was adopted unanimously by the Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) at the sixth meeting of its fifty-ninth session on 26 February 2004.

### **CHAPTER I**

#### **ISSUES CALLING FOR ACTION BY THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL**

2. The Commission endorsed the United Nations Framework Classification for Fossil Energy and Mineral Resources and proposed to the Economic and Social Council that it recommend its application worldwide.

### **CHAPTER II**

#### **WORK OF THE COMMISSION SINCE ITS FIFTY-EIGHTH SESSION**

##### **A. Activities of subsidiary bodies**

3. A list of meetings held since the fifty-eighth session is contained in Annex I, showing in each case the dates, the officers and the symbols of the report. These reports record the agreements reached and decisions taken.

##### **B. Other activities**

4. The secretariat serviced the regular session of the Commission, Ad Hoc Informal Meetings of the Commission, meetings of its subsidiary bodies, and other meetings held under its auspices. Periodic reviews, including the Economic Survey of Europe, specialized statistical bulletins and other publications were issued (see Annex II). The secretariat maintained close and regular liaison with United Nations Headquarters and cooperated with the Departments concerned, as well as with the secretariats of the other regional commissions on projects of common interest.

##### **C. Relations with other United Nations Programmes**

5. The cooperation of the Commission and its secretariat in 2003/2004 with various United Nations bodies and other international organizations, as well as with their secretariats, has continued as called for in the Plan of Action.

## CHAPTER III

### FIFTY-NINTH SESSION OF THE COMMISSION

#### A. Attendance and organization of work

6. The fifty-ninth session of the Commission was held from 24 to 26 February 2004. The Commission heard statements by the Chairman and the Executive Secretary as called for in the agenda.
7. The fifty-ninth session was attended by representatives from Albania, Armenia, Austria, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Canada, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Georgia, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Monaco, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Republic of Moldova, Romania, Russian Federation, San Marino, Serbia and Montenegro, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, The former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Turkey, Ukraine, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, United States of America, and Uzbekistan.
8. The session was attended by representatives of the European Community.
9. Representatives of the Holy See participated under article 8 of the Commission's terms of reference.
10. Representatives of the United Nations Regional Commissions New York Office (RCNYO), United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-HABITAT), United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), and the following intergovernmental organizations were in attendance: Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE), European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), Organization of the Black Sea Economic Cooperation (BSEC), Central European Initiative (CEI), Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS), Black Sea Trade and Development Bank (BSTDB), International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies.
11. The following non-governmental organizations were represented: Centro de Estudios Europeos de Cuba, European Advisory Council for Technology (EACT), Institute of Economic Forecasting, International Council of Women (ICW), International Federation of Business and Professional Women, International Federation of University Women (IFUW), Zonta International.

### **C. Election of Officers**

14. The Chairman of the fifty-ninth session of the Commission was Mr. Clyde Kull (Estonia) and the Vice-Chairpersons Mr. Vladimir Thanati (Albania), Mr. Sergei Aleinik (Belarus) and Mr. Michel Adam (Belgium).

15. The Rapporteurs of the session were Mrs Gabriela Constantinescu (Romania) and Mrs. Mariana Noteboom (Netherlands).

16. At its sixth meeting the Commission elected Mr. Wolfgang Petritsch (Austria) Chairman of the sixtieth session. Mr. Vladimir Thanati (Albania), Mr. Sergei Aleinik (Belarus) were re-elected Vice-Chairpersons of the sixtieth session. Mr. Algimantas Rimkunas (Lithuania) was elected Vice-Chairperson of the sixtieth session.

### **D. Account of proceedings**

#### **Economic developments in the UNECE region (Agenda item 2)**

17. For the consideration of this item the Commission had before it the Economic Survey of Europe 2004 No. 1.

18. The findings of the Economic Survey were presented to the Commission. Among the points made were the following:

- Economic recovery had gained momentum throughout the region in the course of 2003, led by robust growth in the United States, but also supported by dynamic expansion in emerging Asia and Japan;
- The euro area, however, had lagged behind primarily due to sluggish performance in the three largest economies, France, Germany and Italy;
- Growth had picked up in Eastern Europe, while the CIS was among the most dynamic regions in the world;

- The outlook for 2004 was generally optimistic, although considerable downside risks remained, notably persistent current account imbalances in the United States and associated risks of excessive exchange rate volatility.

19. The following issues were raised in connection with the discussion on the Economic Survey of Europe, No.1, 2004:

- The late submission of the Survey considerably hampered the opportunities for a thorough exchange of views during the Session. The secretariat was therefore urged, in future, to provide delegations with a draft Survey well in advance of the annual session;
- The debate was used to question the structure, themes and timeliness of the Survey\*;
- The secretariat was invited to consult with member States on special topics for inclusion in the future Surveys. At the same time, the secretariat reminded the Commission of the importance of independent and objective economic analysis;
- The need to ensure value-added of the Survey was emphasized, and the inclusion of latest available data from reliable sources, in order to provide a full picture and sound conclusions, as well as improve the quality of the analysis and conclusions in the Survey;
- The necessity to avoid any duplication with other analytical papers regularly produced by other United Nations and non-United Nations organizations was also mentioned.

**Policies to stimulate competitiveness and growth**  
(Agenda item 3)

20. The discussion on this item was organized around two Round Tables as follows:

(i) Round Table I: «Best practices and national policies that have proved successful in increasing competitiveness and growth». Ambassador Clyde Kull, Chairperson, UNECE, acted as the moderator. The following senior officials participated as panellists: Mrs. Signe Ratso, Deputy Secretary General, European Union and International Co-operation Department, Ministry of Economic Affairs and Communications of Estonia; Mr. Ilkka Mytty, Financial Counsellor, Department of Economics, Ministry of Finance of Finland; Mr. Dmitry Liakishev, Head of Division, Department of International Organizations and Multilateral Trade Negotiations, Ministry of Economic Development and Trade of the Russian Federation; and Ms. Lynn Cassel, Deputy Chief of Mission, Permanent Mission of the United States to the United Nations Office in Geneva.

(ii) Round Table II: «Regional Initiatives and Cooperation in the UNECE Region and the Role of UNECE in Stimulating Competitiveness». Ms. Z. Shaimerghanova, Ambassador, Permanent

Representative of Kyrgyzstan to the United Nations Office at Geneva; Mr. W. Padina, Deputy Director-General for European Integration and International Affairs, Ministry of Transport, Construction and Tourism, Romania; Mr. C. Tsarouchas, Secretary-General, Black Sea Trade and Development Bank; Ms. A. Stankovic, Councillor of the Embassy, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Slovenia, representing the Central European Initiative (CEI) presidency; Mr. P. Sanfey, Senior Economist, European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD).

21. The first Round Table identified best practices and national policies that have proved successful in increasing competitiveness and growth:

- (i) Government policies matter for competitiveness and growth
- (ii) However, competitiveness is not a matter of big versus small government
- (iii) The experiences of different countries show that the key to achieving or maintaining competitiveness is to ensure the effectiveness of government policies and institutions that channel market forces towards desirable outcomes
- (iv) The discussion revealed that there are substantial differences in this regard within the UNECE region
- (v) Government financial support should be focused on areas where social returns exceed private returns and therefore private funding would be inadequate
- (vi) A competitive economy needs creative entrepreneurial activity
- (vii) It is therefore important to lower the costs of doing business, to dismantle excessive administrative barriers and to improve the efficiency of government services
- (viii) At the same time, an effective competition policy should boost competitiveness and growth
- (ix) Sophisticated technology will be increasingly important for competitiveness in the future
- (x) A competitive economy therefore requires an efficient education system and a steady flow of investment in human capital
- (xi) Also, experience suggests that it is important to encourage private sector to invest in R&D

22. The second Round Table focused on regional initiatives and cooperation in the UNECE region and on the role of UNECE in stimulating competitiveness. Based on the contributions of the panellists and the subsequent discussion on the floor, the following points can be highlighted:

- (i) regional cooperation can play an important role in fostering competitiveness and growth

- (ii) presently, there are significant differences across subregions in the extent of integration and cooperation
- (iii) regional initiatives should include a focus on competitiveness among their priorities
- (iv) in order to be effective, these priorities have to be translated into clear operative targets that can be monitored
- (v) currently, there is still a lack of efficient mechanisms for implementation of operative targets
- (vi) regional initiatives should make sure to involve all relevant stakeholders including central and local governments, the business and academic communities
- (vii) it is important to harness funding from governments but also from international financial institutions and the private sector, particularly to support the emergence of a vibrant network of small and medium-sized innovative enterprises
- (viii) one key priority should be the promotion of free trade, market access and trade facilitation; in this regard, regional cooperation is especially important in the development of infrastructure (in the areas of transport, telecommunication, and energy networks) and in the harmonization of regulatory frameworks
- (ix) another important area for regional cooperation is the opening of labour markets and the facilitation of intra-regional labour mobility
- (x) regional organizations like UNECE could provide a forum for the exchange of best practices, for instance on education, human resource management, entrepreneurship, science and technology management, ICT and information society
- (xi) it is encouraging that existing regional initiatives are increasingly promoting the transition to knowledge-based economies via the promotion of education, human resources development and training, and research and development

23. The discussion noted the role the UNECE has played in promoting competitiveness and growth by promoting regional free trade, developing efficient infrastructure in transport and energy, encouraging transition to a knowledge-based economy, and by providing a forum for discussing and exchanging best practices, encouraging and contributing to initiatives at the regional and subregional level, and offering technical assistance, notably in meeting the new challenges posed by the advance of the knowledge-driven economy. The significant role of the EU Lisbon Strategy for economic, social and environmental renewal was also mentioned by a number of speakers.

#### **The UNECE reform** (Agenda item 4)

24. The Commission considered this item on the basis of documents «The UNECE Reform» (E/ECE/1411), «Technical Cooperation Strategy» (E/ECE/1411/Add.1) and «Work of the Group

of Experts on the Programme of Work» (E/ECE/1415/Add.1). The Chairman of the Commission also tabled two proposals: one on the conduct of an external review of the UNECE and another on adjustments to the programme planning process.

25. The paper on reform and information on the follow-up already taken on the actions proposed by the secretariat in 2003 was welcomed. Given the enlargement of the EU and the new geopolitical reality within the region, the role and place of the UNECE in the new European institutional architecture needed to be reviewed, in order to ensure its relevance and effectiveness in the new European context.

26. In line with these views and taking into account the recommendations of the Committee for Programme and Coordination (A/58/16), in support of the current United Nations (A/58/351) and Economic Commission for Europe (E/ECE/1411) reform exercises, and building on the recommendation of the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work (GEPW) (E/ECE/1415/Add.1), the Commission thus decided to commission a comprehensive report on the state of the UNECE with the aim of developing recommendations to determine what changes to the role, mandate and functions of the UNECE are necessary in light of the changes in the European institutional architecture since the UNECE was created almost 60 years ago. The report should be guided by the will of member States to avoid duplication, and ensure cooperation, complementarity and efficiencies among intergovernmental organizations. The review exercise should also cover the mandate of the GEPW with a view to possibly strengthening its role as an intergovernmental supervisory body within the UNECE. All stakeholders should be consulted by the authors. Relevant best practices in other organizations as well as management evaluations of other fora will be a reference in this regard.

27. Further, the Commission instructed the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work to develop terms of reference and a budget, and determine the qualified author(s), for the report, for approval at an ad hoc informal meeting of the Commission before 31 May 2004. The report should be paid for out of extra-budgetary resources committed for this purpose. The report should be prepared in time to allow it to be considered at the Sixtieth Annual Session of the Commission in early 2005.

28. The Commission also endorsed the actions proposed by the secretariat, as well as the recommendations proposed by the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work, as follows:

With regard to intergovernmental structures,

- (a) The Annual Session will discuss adjustment of the intergovernmental structure at the Commission level if any eligible body proposes it (Action 1 of document E/ECE/1399);
- (b) The Principal Subsidiary Bodies (PSBs) of UNECE will review biennially their intergovernmental structure, including related advisory groups and report to the Commission at its Annual Session (Action 2 of document E/ECE/1399, orally revised).

With regard to evaluation of the work of the Principal Subsidiary Bodies,

- (c) The Commission endorsed the proposals on best practice for evaluation as outlined in the report of the GEPW, E/ECE/1415/Add.1 biennially.

With regard to the priority setting mechanism for technical cooperation activities,

- (d) The Commission endorsed the proposals by the Group of Experts as contained in Annex II of the document E/ECE/1411.

29. As part of the discussion on the reform, the following observations and proposals were made by delegations:

- Need to ensure transparency and effectiveness in the management of budgetary and extrabudgetary resources;
- Invite the secretariat to hold consultations with member States when planning seminars and workshops in order to ensure inclusion of needed themes, an appropriate level of participation and geographical balance in representation of sub-regions and groups;
- Strive to put information and documents on the UNECE website in the three official languages of the Commission;
- Stop the publication and dissemination of the biannual collections of UNECE press releases.

30. Concerning the work programme planning process, in view of the complexity of the issues involved and the need to fulfil requirements of United Nations Headquarters, the Commission requested the secretariat and the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work to work together to produce a new version, based on the amended proposal tabled by the Chairman, that will provide more information on the timing of each stage of the process, with a view to submitting it for endorsement by the Commission at its next ad hoc informal session.

31. The Commission endorsed the Technical Cooperation Strategy contained in E/ECE/1411/Add.1 and urged the secretariat to implement it. The Strategy was seen as a response to the new challenges faced by the Commission in the area of technical cooperation that identified measures aimed at addressing these challenges as well as supporting the priority-setting mechanism, improving the system of monitoring and evaluation, and strengthening coordination and fund-raising in support of technical cooperation activities. Member States expressed their appreciation of UNECE work in this area, including the work of the regional advisers. The need to further strengthen technical assistance activities particularly in SEE and South Caucasus and CA, and to improve cooperation with other parts of the United Nations family such as UNDP and UNEP was also underscored.

32. In addressing UNECE technical cooperation some delegations also expressed the following views:

- The need for mobilization of additional extrabudgetary resources for technical cooperation activities
- Technical cooperation should remain demand-driven and results-oriented, and be carried out in accordance with the UNECE core sub-programmes.
- The need for the Regional Advisers to consult with those member States to whom they render advisory services on the purpose and organizational aspects of their country missions.

**The UNECE's cooperation with OSCE**  
(Agenda item 5)

33. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of document E/ECE/1410, entitled the UNECE's Cooperation with OSCE, and Conference Room Paper 2.

34. Points emphasized by the Executive Secretary of the UNECE and the Secretary-General of the OSCE in their introductory statements included:

- The 1997 UNECE Plan of Action stated that the UNECE should consolidate cooperation with organizations such as the OSCE, which have a similar membership to the UNECE and a complementary mandate.
- The UNECE enjoyed a privileged position among all the organizations with which the OSCE cooperated and the OSCE's New Strategy Document identified the UNECE as the key partner in the implementation of the Document.
- The New Strategy Document of the OSCE provided the basis for a new and deeper relationship between the OSCE and UNECE but the relationship had still to be defined.
- An intersecretariat task force had been established that would prepare a detailed plan for cooperation on the basis of which a Memorandum of Understanding between the two organizations would be prepared. The plan, which would include resource implications for the work proposed to be carried out by the UNECE and OSCE, would be submitted to both the Commission and the OSCE Economic and Environment Sub-Committee for consideration and decision regarding the support to be given to the OSCE.

35. During the discussion a number of points were made:

- The Commission welcomed the formalization of relations between OSCE and the UNECE in the form of a Memorandum of Understanding, which should not duplicate the work done under other cooperation agreements. The draft Memorandum of Understanding will be discussed with member States;

- The UNECE work with OSCE should be reflected in the UNECE's programme of work 2006-2007. For the current programme of work, the secretariat will provide an ad hoc adjustment;
- Resource implications of the cooperation between the UNECE and OSCE should be provided to member States for their consideration, including ways of possible financing;
- Cooperation with other international and regional organizations in the implementation of the New Strategy Document should be supported in order to complement the limited mandate and competence of the UNECE;
- The need to review and prioritize the work of the Economic Analysis Division, including the Economic Survey, was mentioned. In addition, it was stated that also other Divisions, in particular the Environment and Human Settlements Division and the Trade and Timber Division, should take into account the fact that the new enhanced relationship with OSCE may have implications on the work of the various UNECE Divisions.
- The establishment of the intersecretariat task force that is open and transparent and which will allow for the involvement of member States was welcomed.

36. The Commission provided general agreement on continued cooperation between the UNECE and OSCE. It agreed to the proposal of the Executive Secretary, namely that the intersecretariat task force prepare a detailed plan, including resource implications, that would be subsequently submitted to the Commission for its consideration and decision. The Commission further agreed to the involvement of the UNECE in the transitional review of commitments in preparation for the OSCE Economic Forum in June 2004 in the same manner as it has been doing so far.

**The work of the UNECE: Achievements, constraints and perspectives**  
(Agenda item 6)

37. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of the document « The Work of the UNECE: Achievements, Constraints and Perspectives» (E/ECE/1412).

38. The Chairpersons/Vice-Chairpersons of PSBs made presentations focusing on the outlook and challenges ahead, in particular the impact of the EU enlargement on their work.

39. A number of points were made during the discussion, including:

- Most of the PSBs have already reviewed their priorities and activities in the light of the EU enlargement;
- There is a need for higher involvement of countries from the CIS region, Central Asia and South East Europe in ECE activities;



- It was proposed to provide consolidated information on the schedule of meetings and seminars under all PSBs at future Annual Sessions with a view to better planning the participation of delegates from member States;
- It was suggested to supplement the report on Achievements, Constraints and Perspectives with additional information concerning administrative and financial matters, as well as with a qualitative assessment of programme implementation;
- Concern was expressed regarding the consequences of the General Assembly's decision to freeze recruitment of extrabudgetary General Service posts servicing a number of activities, including UNECE's legal instruments.

40. The Chair concluded by emphasizing the usefulness of hearing about UNECE's work from the PSBs.

**Preparations for, and follow-up to, global and regional conferences**  
(Agenda item 7)

41. The discussion under this item took place on the basis of the note by the Executive Secretary on «Preparation for and Follow-up to World and Regional Conferences» (E/ECE/1413) and Conference Room Paper 3 on «Proposal for UNECE's Follow-up Activities to the World Summit on the Information Society».

42. With regard to the World Summit on the Information Society, the Commission endorsed the following proposals contained in Conference Room paper 3:

- UNECE will participate in the high-level organizing committee (HLSOC) for the second phase of the WSIS;
- UNECE will participate in the three PrepCom meetings for the Summit;
- UNECE will liaise with the WSIS Executive Secretariat regarding the possible organization of preparatory meetings and side events at the Tunis summit;
- Member States will consult at an ad hoc informal meeting of the Commission regarding the possibility of developing projects with other regional commissions;
- UNECE will further develop the e-assessment reports already agreed in the UNECE programme of work under the Committee for Trade, Industry and Enterprise Development.

43. It was also agreed that UNECE will ask the United Nations Statistical Commission to take the lead in possibly organizing a regional ICT-related meeting on the monitoring of information society issues, in cooperation with relevant regional and international organizations, with UNECE participating as appropriate.

44. The Commission also endorsed the proposal of the Executive Secretary to help organize one or two sub-regional meetings to promote the implementation of the information society in the concerned countries and to benefit from the exchange of best practices and policies in them.

45. The Commission noted the success of the First Regional Implementation Forum on Sustainable Development and looked forward to the debate within the Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD). The exercise proved very useful and should be repeated in future, taking into account developments in the CSD.

46. With regard to the International Ministerial Conference of Landlocked and Transit Developing Countries on Transit Transport Cooperation, the Commission endorsed the proposal that, as a follow-up to the Conference, UNECE could within its present resources continue or undertake the activities outlined in paragraph 29 of document E/ECE/1413.

47. With regard to follow-up to Beijing, the Commission endorsed the proposal to organize a UNECE regional preparatory meeting for Beijing +10 to take place in the last quarter of 2004, as was done in 2000.

48. The Commission also endorsed the proposal of the Executive Secretary to devote the High Level Policy segment of the Sixtieth Annual Session of the Commission to the topic of follow-up to the International Conference on Financing for Development (FfD), and recommended FfD as a thematic orientation of the next Spring Seminar.

#### **Overview of UNECE technical cooperation activities** (Agenda item 8)

49. The Commission considered this agenda item on the basis of the document «UNECE Technical Cooperation Activities in 2003: An Overview» (E/ECE/1414).

50. During the ensuing discussion, the following points were made:

- Appreciation was expressed for the informative and well-structured document that provided a clear picture of technical cooperation activities, including relevant financial information.
- The importance of technical cooperation activities, that are well structured both sectorally and geographically, was underlined as an essential supporting part of the UNECE activities.
- Technical cooperation should be focused on the countries most in need, be demand-driven and result-oriented, and it should be carried out in accordance with the UNECE core sub-programmes of work in accordance with the Technical Cooperation Strategy endorsed at the present session.
- The work of the Regional Advisers was highly appreciated, in particular in the areas of sustainable energy, environment, transport and statistics.
- The work programmes of some Regional Advisers should be more clearly defined.

- The need for more active consultations with member States in preparing Regional Advisers' work programmes was highlighted. The need for finding additional resources for the second Regional Adviser on transport was underlined.
- Technical cooperation activities need to be supported by additional resources and the secretariat was urged to undertake additional efforts for attracting extra-budgetary resources, in particular through involvement of the private sector as appropriate.
- While cooperation with other organizations in implementing technical cooperation activities was appreciated, there is a need for stepping-up inter-agency coordination in this area.

**Report of the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work (GEPW)**  
(Agenda item 9)

51. The Commission considered this item on the basis of documents on the Work of the Group of Experts on the Programme of Work (E/ECE/1415 and Add.1)

52. The proposals on best practice for evaluation as outlined in the report of the GEPW (E/ECE/1415/Add.1) were endorsed by the Commission during its discussion of the agenda item 4 on UNECE reform (see paragraph 28 above).

53. The Commission expressed its appreciation for the work done by the GEPW and the effective role played by its Chairperson. In view of the additional tasks assigned to the Group by the Commission and the strengthened role in guiding the activities of UNECE, the need to redefine the mandate of GEPW was reiterated. It was noted that this issue would be covered by the review exercise already decided by the Commission (see paragraph 26 above).

**Other business**

54. As indicated in the letter of the Executive Secretary to member States of 5 February 2004, at its thirteenth session in November 2003, the Committee on Sustainable Energy approved the United Nations Framework Classification for Fossil Energy and Mineral Resources that had been developed by the Ad Hoc Group of Experts on the Harmonization of Energy Reserves/Resources Terminology, and recommended its application to all countries worldwide. The Committee further requested the Commission to endorse the Classification and to submit a proposal for an ECOSOC decision to this effect.

55. The Commission endorsed the United Nations Framework Classification for Fossil Energy and Mineral Resources and decided to propose to ECOSOC that it recommend its application to all countries worldwide.
