Strategic Framework of the Statistics subprogramme for 2016-17

Prepared by the Secretariat

Summary

The note provides the Strategic Framework for the biennium 2016-2017 of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe Statistics subprogramme. It defines the objective of the subprogramme, expected accomplishments, performance measures, a strategy and external factors as well as the legislative mandates for its work. The Strategic Framework of the Statistics subprogramme has four main areas of work linked to the expected accomplishments:

- Streamlined international statistical work;
- Updated and newly developed standards and recommendations to enhance international comparability of statistics;
- Improved national capacities to implement international standards and recommendations in official statistics;
- Improved availability and increased use of statistics from the ECE database, in particular related to international development goals, gender equality, key socio-economic indicators and sustainable development in support of evidence-based policymaking in ECE member States.

The note is presented to the Conference of European Statisticians for approval. It was endorsed by the Bureau of the Conference of European Statisticians in October 2013.

Objective of the Organization: To improve the quality of official statistics at the national and international levels, and to ensure the coordination of international statistical activities undertaken in the ECE region

I. Strategy

1. The responsibility for the subprogramme is vested in the Statistical Division. The subprogramme aims to improve the quality, coverage and timeliness, as well as coherence of official statistics for evidence-based economic, social and environmental policymaking, and for assessing progress towards international development goals and sustainable development.
2. Coordinating international statistical activities in the region will remain a central component of the strategy under the subprogramme. The strong involvement of national statistical organizations in setting priorities will ensure that the work focuses on addressing the special needs of countries of the region. Cooperation with the statistical services of other UN entities and international organizations will continue in the form of joint meetings and working groups to develop standards and recommendations, and identify good practices.
3. The subprogramme will work on priorities identified by the ECE member States, with a special focus on measuring sustainable development and the post-2015 development agenda; globalization; population, poverty and inequality; promoting modernisation of statistical production; and capacity building. The subprogramme will take into account the recent methodological and technological development in official statistics, including the geospatial information. The work will be undertaken in close cooperation with experts from ECE member States and international organizations in the form of expert groups that perform specific tasks within a set time frame. The work will result in the development of methodological and practical guidelines in statistics, including training materials which will be made available on the web.
4. The subprogramme will provide support and guidance to the ECE member States, particularly those with less developed statistical systems regarding existing United Nations standards and best practices and their implementation at the national level. To this end, the subprogramme will promote the Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics and provide advice on institutional frameworks of official statistics, for example, by conducting global assessments of national statistical systems. The advisory work will be demand-driven, focusing on areas where United Nations standards and recommendations exist, such as population censuses, international development goals, national accounts, prices, business statistics, gender disaggregated statistics, environmental indicators and modernising statistical production.
5. The subprogramme will collect and disseminate statistical information, including on progress towards the achievement of international development goals and gender equality. These statistics will be accessible to the public on the Internet. A quality framework will ensure the relevance, timeliness and user-friendliness of dissemination. The data will help to identify priorities for improvement of the quality and comparability of official statistics.

II. External factors

6. The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objective and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) there is a willingness to cooperate on the part of international statistical organizations, in particular the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), the Statistical Office of the European Union (Eurostat), the Interstate Statistical Committee of the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS-STAT), the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank, as well as on the part of the national statistical organizations of ECE member countries, (b) resource

constraints would not hamper the participation of national statistical offices in international work nor impede the implementation of the resulting standards, (c) development work carried out by national statistical offices continues on key statistical domains, (d) resources are available in order to provide support for the national statistical organizations of countries with less developed statistical systems, (e) data needed for the ECE statistical database are made available by the national and international statistical organizations free of charge, and the technological infrastructure is sufficient for databases and web dissemination.
