1.9:	Eurostat	<p>Theme 1.04 Culture</p> <p>1. Description This theme covers all statistics relating to culture and cultural industries. A definition of the cultural domain was prepared by EC LEG-Culture and adopted by the SPC in 1999. A methodology to identify cultural employment by matching economic sectors (NACE) and occupations (ISCO) has been developed and now data are available annually from the EU-Labour Force Survey. Methodological work on cultural participation has also been carried out and its recommendations could be implemented through surveys to obtain comparative results at EU level. A study concerning statistics on private expenditure on culture will help in the future exploitation of the Household Budget Surveys. Finally, the basic elements of a methodology to cover public expenditure on culture have been produced, but further development is required before the methodology can be used for the collection of data through a specific administrative data collection. Economic statistics on cultural industries are available from the EU-Structural Business Statistics database but the coverage of this sector is very limited at the moment. Cooperation with the UNESCO Institute for Statistics is essential in this area, while the Council of Europe will be informed and involved when necessary. OECD activities in this area should also be looked at.</p> <p>2. Work Programme for 2008</p> <p>2.1 KEY PRIORITIES 2008 Given the renewed interest by the Council in statistics on culture in the context of the Lisbon strategy, it is planned to continue or restart the work already initiated by the LEG, WG and TF on culture statistics. Both methodological work and data production, mainly based on existing data, will be proposed. Methodological work should also include progress on the definitions of the cultural and creative industries. Proposals will be drawn up to improve the harmonisation of the different fields of cultural statistics. Close cooperation with all Member States and with international organisations is required in this development work.</p> <p>2.2 OBJECTIVES 2008</p> <p>2.2.2. New work</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Re-launch the working group (form and mandate to be determined), designate delegates from Member States (and international organisations) and establish mode of cooperation with other international bodies • Prepare inventory of existing (and planned) national data sources for cultural statistics • Carry out development and production work in some areas of cultural statistics (cultural industries, expenditures on culture, trade of cultural goods and services)
1.9:	CIS-STAT	<p>Culture and Arts</p> <p>Ongoing work:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Collection, processing, analysis and dissemination of data provided by national statistical services as part of the interstate exchange of information on culture and the arts. • Annual preparation of analytical material illustrating selected data on culture and the arts in Commonwealth countries. • It is intended to provide advisory services to national statistical services on the organization of culture statistics in Commonwealth countries.

1.9:	OECD (2007)	<p><u>Culture and Art-related Activities</u></p> <p>Purpose</p> <p>To build up a framework and detailed methodologies for the statistical measurement of the economic and social importance of culture and art-related activities, including the investigation of national methodologies and practices.</p> <p>To compile data already available from national and other sources and to present selected indicators in the OECD Factbook.</p> <p>Objectives and outputs</p> <p>This project is conducted by the OECD and is currently supported by the Louise T Blouin Foundation.</p> <p>New tables on Leisure and Culture statistics drawn from the OECD annual national accounts database were supplied for the 2006 OECD Factbook.</p> <p>An international workshop was held on December 2006 that endorsed the activities of the OECD in the field of culture and made several other recommendations.</p> <p>The objectives for 2007 will partially depend on whether continued external funding is obtained. Without external funding, the objectives are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Coordinate input from the culture sector to the update process of ISCO. - Prepare comparative tables at the city level for a selection of culture-related measures. - Finalize the draft paper on the 'Measurement of the Economic and Social Importance of Culture'. <p>Non-member countries involved in the activity:</p> <p>Chile, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, New Zealand</p> <p>Main Developments for 2007</p> <p>General aspects:</p> <p>An international workshop held in December 2006 endorsed the initial work of the project and recommended that the OECD continue its work in the field, working in cooperation with other international agencies with an interest in culture.</p> <p>The workshop made additional recommendations in relation to required changes in classification standards and the development of detailed methodologies for collecting truly comparable data.</p> <p>The project is currently supported by external contributions and its final workplan may depend on whether there is continued external support for the project.</p>
