Draft programme of work of the Trade subprogramme for 2020

Note by the Secretariat

Introduction

1. The present document sets out the draft programme of work of the Trade subprogramme (“the subprogramme”) for 2020. The Steering Committee on Trade Capacity and Standards (“the Committee”) is invited to adopt it and recommend to the Executive Committee (Excom) for approval. Any subsequent additional, discontinued or carried over outputs will be reflected in Umoja used by the Secretariat for planning, monitoring and reporting on the implementation of the programme.
2. The draft programme of work applies a results-based management (RBM) approach, a broad management approach which establishes logical relationship between the hierarchical results (deliverables – objectives – impact) known as ‘results chain’, the resources (human and financial) known as ‘inputs’ and the external factors (strategic, governance, operational, financial) which can prevent from achieving the objective.
3. The objective, the most significant planned result and the deliverables in the draft programme of work correspond to those contained in the ECE proposed programme budget for 2020. The objective of the subprogramme is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In attaining its objective, the subprogramme builds on cross-sectoral collaboration with other subprogrammes in relevant ECE nexus areas where multiple SDGs converge¹. This type of collaboration enables the subprogramme to maximize existing

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synergies, increase the efficiency of its work and have a multiplying effect on the impact of its actions to support countries to implement SDGs. The deliverables of the subprogramme fall into the following main categories: (a) facilitation of the intergovernmental process and expert groups; (b) generation and transfer of knowledge, including technical cooperation projects, training events, seminars, workshops, and publications; (c) other substantive deliverables, and (d) communication deliverables.

4. The details of the proposed publications are provided in Annex I. The overall ECE legislative mandates and those specific for the subprogramme are listed in Annex II.

I. Objective and alignment with SDGs

5. The objective of the subprogramme is to enhance trade facilitation, agricultural quality standards, regulatory and trade-related economic cooperation for the transition to sustainable economic growth and sustainable production and consumption in the ECE region and beyond.

6. The responsibility for the subprogramme is vested in the Economic Cooperation and Trade Division.

7. The objective is aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 8, which is to ‘promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all’. Progress towards the attainment of the objective will help to: “achieve higher levels of economic productivity through diversification, technological upgrading and innovation, including through a focus on high-value added and labour-intensive sectors”; “promote development-oriented policies that support productive activities, decent job creation, entrepreneurship, creativity and innovation, and encourage the growth of micro-, small- and medium-sized enterprises, including through access to financial services”; and “increase Aid for Trade support for developing countries”.

8. The objective is also aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 12, which is to ‘ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns. Progress towards the attainment of the objective will help to: “halve per capita global food waste and reduce food losses along production and supply chains, including post-harvest losses”; encourage companies, especially large and transnational companies, to adopt sustainable practices; “promote public procurement practices that are sustainable, in accordance with national policies and practices”; ensure that people have the relevant information and awareness for sustainable development; and “support developing countries to strengthen their technological capacity to move towards more sustainable patterns of consumption and production”.

9. The objective is further aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 17, which is to ‘strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the Global Partnership for Sustainable Development’. Progress towards the attainment of the objective will help to: promote a multilateral trading system; increase the exports of developing countries; strengthen domestic resource mobilization to improve domestic capacity for revenue collection; enhance the use of information and communications technology; enhance the Global Partnership for Sustainable Development to share knowledge, expertise, technology and financial resources; encourage and promote public, public-private and civil society partnerships; and enhance capacity-building support to developing countries.

10. The objective is also aligned with Sustainable Development Goal 5, which is to ‘achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls’. Progress towards the attainment of the objective will help to: ensure women’s effective participation for leadership at all levels of decision-making in economic life; undertake reforms to give women equal rights to economic resources and financial services; enhance the use of information and communications technology, to promote the empowerment of women; and adopt and

strengthen sound policies and enforceable legislation for the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls at all levels.

11. Alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals serves as a framework for contributing to the objective of the subprogramme. Within this framework, the subprogramme will develop cross-sectoral activities with other ECE subprogrammes where there is complementarity between the respective SDGs and targets in line with the nexus areas described in paragraph 3 above.

II. Highlighted planned result for 2020

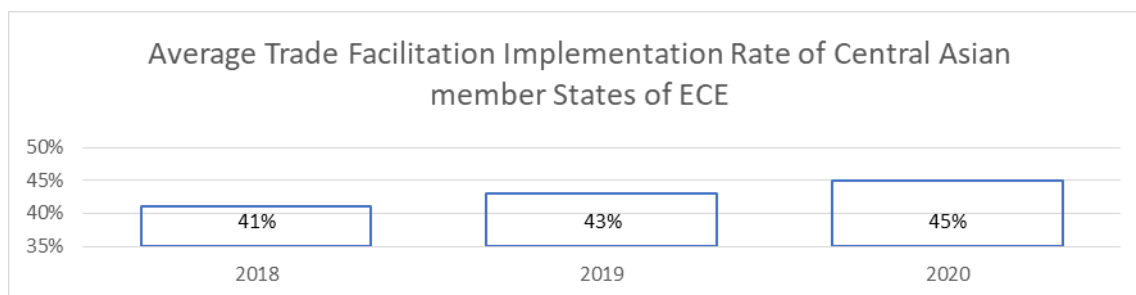
Enhancing trade efficiency in Central Asia

12. In 2018, according to the 2017 Global Survey on Trade Facilitation and Paperless Trade, the average implementation rate of trade facilitation measures in Central Asian countries (Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan) was 41%, which was lower than other sub-regions. The challenge was that cutting unnecessary trade barriers for faster and efficient global trade was not progressing as well as in other sub-regions and, as for landlocked countries, there was an urgent need to reduce the burden of bureaucratic processes and increasing automation of trade-related regulatory procedures.

13. In 2018, Central Asian countries requested ECE support to improve the performance in trade facilitation, in particular, policies and actions that would make trade simpler and easier for traders. In response, for 2020, ECE will help Central Asian countries to implement its policy recommendations through its outreach and capacity-building support in the areas of e-commerce and adoption of standards for trade facilitation. These policy recommendations cover the implementation of a variety of ECE agricultural quality standards as well as trade facilitation recommendations such as the Single Window (UN/CEFACT Recommendations 33-36) and tools for consultation, public-private partnerships and monitoring in trade facilitation (UN/CEFACT Recommendations 40-42) in the global Trade Facilitation Agreement context.

14. The planned deliverable is expected to contribute to the result, which is to improve trade facilitation implementation rate in Central Asia. This rate is based on the percentage of implementation of trade facilitation tools, instruments, standards and recommendations, as evidenced by the biennial UN Regional Commissions' Global Survey on Trade Facilitation and Paperless Trade. This will be achieved through National Trade Facilitation Committees operationalized, and policy recommendations, standards and tools in trade facilitation and e-business such as Single Window Development implemented, to speed up import and export processes. It is expected that in 2020, the Central Asian countries would implement many of the policy recommendations, standards and tools to reduce bureaucratic burdens and unnecessary trade procedures.

15. Evidence of the result, if achieved, will include an increased average trade facilitation implementation rate of 45% for the Central Asian countries in the planned UN Regional Commissions Global Survey on Trade Facilitation and Paperless Trade 2019-2020, as shown in the figure below.

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Note: (i) The UNRC Global Survey is undertaken every two years. The data for 2018 is taken from the 2017-2018 survey and the data for 2020 will be taken from the 2019-2020 survey. The Central Asian countries are expected to adopt standards and tools during 2018-2020; (ii) Data for 2019 is an estimate for the intermediate result.

16. The result, if achieved, will demonstrate progress made in 2020 towards the collective attainment of the objective. It will also contribute to the nexus areas on sustainable mobility and smart connectivity and sustainable use of natural resources.

III. External factors

17. The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objective on the assumption that: (a) there is political will and cooperation among Governments and international organizations; (b) there is demand for ECE standards and recommendations; (c) member States provide the necessary information; (d) there is active participation by experts in ECE technical meetings; and (e) donor support for the work of the subprogramme is adequate.
