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• Since 2020 challenges building up

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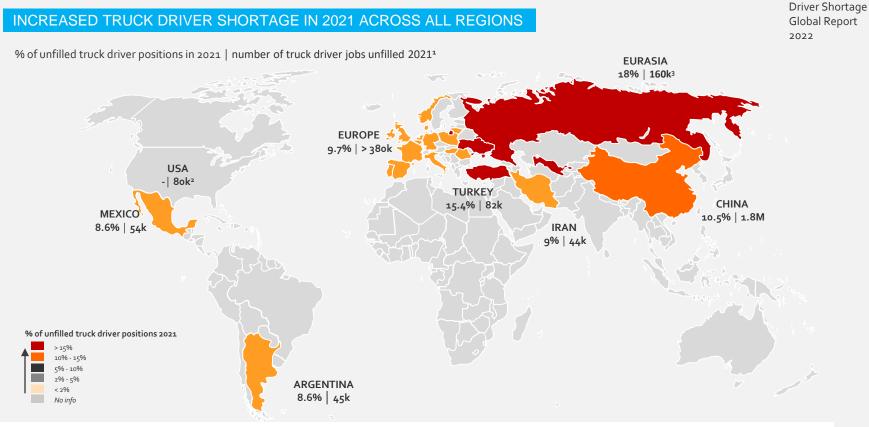
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- Previously common transit routes do not carry the same traffic
- Even higher pressure is put on already congested borders

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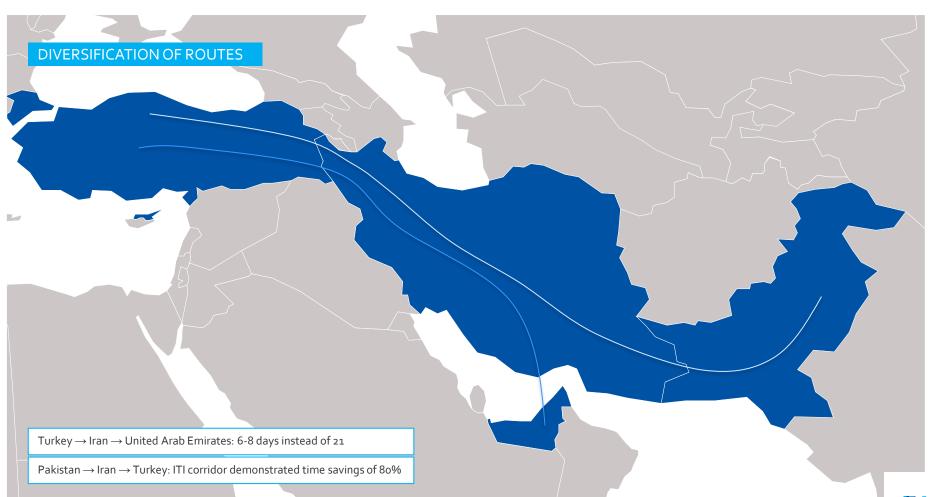

Transport industry should have standard tools in hand

to be able to quickly re-adjust and take alternative routes







- Intensify coordination between relevant agencies of bordering countries and increase coordinated/joint controls
- Remove clearance from borders to inland
- Encourage the use of TIR and CMR for the industry to be ready to take any alternative route, using the same tools, for better **security and facilitation**
