Note by the secretariat

Summary

The Meeting of the Parties to the Convention on Environmental Impact Assessment in a Transboundary Context requested the Convention secretariat, in accordance with the financial rules of the United Nations, to monitor the expenditure of the Convention's funds and to prepare a report for the next session of the Meeting of the Parties, based on the information contained in biannual reports. This report covers the period from after the fifth session of the Meeting of the Parties, in June 2011, to the end of December 2013.

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I. Introduction

1. This report sets out income, in-kind contributions and expenditure in the reporting period, as well as the balance in the Convention's trust fund at the end of the period. It also identifies any savings and overspend. The report addresses work under the Convention, including under its Protocol on Strategic Environmental Assessment. Details of income and expenditure are provided in the annex to this report.

II. Pledges and fund-raising

- 2. The pledges made at the fifth session of the Meeting of the Parties were insufficient to cover the core budget (representing less than 50 per cent of it). The Parties were therefore also invited to come forward with further contributions, and the Meeting of the Parties: (a) encouraged Parties that had up till then not pledged anything to make contributions during the current and future budget cycles; and (b) Parties that had up till then only committed limited funds or in-kind contributions to raise their contributions during the current and future budget cycles.
- 3. The Chair of the Bureau wrote to a number of Parties in March 2012 and again in May 2013 for this purpose. Some Parties made unpledged contributions in the reporting period, including subsequent to the letter from the Chair. Notably, Finland funded an associate expert to support the secretariat for the entire intersessional period (and in total for four years). Norway contributed over seven times more than its initial pledge. No country was in arrears in payment of its pledged contribution.

III. Income and expenditure

- 4. Table 1 summarizes the income and expenditure in United States dollars. (Financial contributions to the Convention's trust fund are listed in tables A.1 and A.2, in annex.)
- 5. Activities under the workplan² were assigned priorities 1 or 2 in the core budget; other activities, not explicitly listed in the workplan or not expected to be covered by the core budget, have been assigned priority 3. Pledged and non-earmarked contributions are only to be used to fund core budget activities with priority 1 or 2.
- 6. Some countries imposed conditions on their contributions, notably by earmarking them for priority-2 activities and especially to support participation in meetings by representatives of countries with economies in transition (CITs). Switzerland made funds available for technical advice to Uzbekistan, as foreseen in the workplan but not expected to be covered by the core budget (therefore assigned priority 3). Sweden and Switzerland provided funds for activities not listed in the workplan but implied in the declaration by the first session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Protocol; these activities have also been assigned priority 3. Switzerland made a contribution to cover practical costs of a side-event to the "Environment for Europe" Ministerial Conference, held in Astana in September 2011, whereas Sweden's contribution is intended to enable the secretariat to support the ratification of the Convention by the Russian Federation. Germany made funds available for the workshop on public participation held jointly with the Aarhus Convention in October 2012. It also funded the

preparation of the draft Good practice recommendations on public participation in SEA (not listed in the workplan);

- 7. One priority-2 activity was not completed within the previous intersessional period and was therefore carried forward, together with its budgeted funds (\$22,600): a subregional cooperation workshop for the Mediterranean Sea.
- 8. The income, together with the funds for the carried-over activity, totalled \$887,573. Outstanding pledged contributions total \$78,761.

- 9. The secretariat spent from the trust fund in accordance with the budget (table A.3, with further details in tables A.5 and A.6). The funds were spent on the two priority-1 activities, namely on an external expert to provide secretariat support and on drafting of the reviews of implementation of the Convention and the Protocol. Funds were also spent on priority-2 activities in the following areas:
 - (a) Eight sessions of the Implementation Committee;
 - (b) Two free-standing meetings of the Bureau;

- (c) A meeting of the Chairs of the Bureaus of the ECE Conventions and of the Committee on Environmental Policy (as no fourth meeting of the Bureau);
- (d) Three meetings of the Working Group on Environmental Impact Assessment and Strategic Environmental Assessment;
- (e) Further secretariat support for the implementation of the Convention and the Protocol: Draft guidance on enhancing consistency between the Convention and State ecological expertise;
 - (f) Secretariat travel in relation to the workplan;
 - (g) The promotion of contacts with countries outside the region.
- 10. In addition, the secretariat spent from the trust fund further to the earmarked contributions by:
- (a) Sweden and Switzerland, on the side-event to the "Environment for Europe" Ministerial Conference and on supporting the ratification of the Convention by the Russian Federation:
- (b) Germany, on the Joint workshop on public participation with the Aarhus Convention, and the preparation of draft Good practice recommendations on public participation in SEA by a consultant.
- 11. The expenditure totalled \$513,131, to which was added 13 per cent United Nations programme support costs of \$66,707, leaving a balance in the trust fund of \$307,736.
- 12. Parties, other States and organizations also undertook the following priority-3 workplan activities in the following areas by providing in-kind contributions (table A.7):
- (a) Financial support of a speaker at the side-event to the "Environment for Europe" Ministerial Conference;
- (b) A subregional cooperation meeting in Poland for the countries of the Baltic Sea area;
- (c) A four-day workshop to strengthen capacity for the development of EIA and SEA systems in Uzbekistan, with sharing of experiences from other countries in the implementation of the Espoo Convention and in particular its Protocol;
- (d) A subregional cooperation meeting in Estonia for the countries of the Baltic Sea area.
- 13. Funds raised through the Environment and Security Initiative (with funding from Sweden) were disbursed to cover the costs of the following workplan activities: Technical advice and training on SEA in Belarus to strengthen capacity to implement the Protocol and the pilot on post-project analysis of transboundary EIA between Belarus and Ukraine in autumn 2013. These funds were expected to also support organization of a subregional seminar to present the results of the pilot project in spring 2014 (total value \$210,000).
- 14. These activities, funded by in-kind contributions, have been valued at \$267,000 in total
- 15. In addition, the EU funds raised by the secretariat through "Greening Economies in the Eastern Neighbourhood" (EaP GREEN) programme generated a substantial increase in income starting from 2013 (totalling €2 Million for 2013–2017). This generated savings in the use of the trust fund and allowed also implementation of several activities included or related to the workplan but not covered or only partially covered by the core budget in Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, the Republic of Moldova, and Ukraine, in particular to promote ratification and application of the Protocol on SEA (legislative

assistance, pilots, workshops with training, subregional experience sharing events). The first tranche amounted to \$454,436 (minus the UN programme support costs). It covered in 2013 cost of one external expert to support the secretariat in planning and management of capacity building activities; an administrative support staff on 50% basis; and capacity building activities, including legislative reviews on SEA in the Republic of Moldova and on EIA in Georgia and training workshops on SEA in Armenia and Ukraine.

IV. Overspending and savings

- 16. Savings, at or exceeding \$10,000 per budget line, are expected to be realized for the following (The total amount of savings will be specified once final expenditure figures are available):
- (a) Expenditure for external expert to provide secretariat support; during the reporting period the extrabudgetary post of the external expert was vacant for several months (expected saving \$50,000)³;
- (b) The staff shortage over an extended period also limited the travel of secretariat, which is expected to generate further savings (\$50,000);
- (c) The promotion of contacts with countries outside the UNECE region was carried out at reduced cost (savings of \$21,584 expected);
- (d) Savings of \$30,000 arose from the Bureau's decision not to fund participation of non ECE countries in the meetings of the Working Group in 2012 and 2013;
- (e) During the intersessional period, the Implementation Committee did not recommend the conduct of any country-specific performance reviews to assist Parties to strengthen their implementation of and compliance with the Convention and the Protocol (Savings for the cancelled activities \$75,000);
- (f) Further to its fund raising from other sources, the secretariat could finance workplan activities without use of the trust fund, which is expected to result in savings for costs of consultants (of \$40,000): (e.g. for the pre-accession legislative support to the Republic of Moldova; pilot transboundary EIA between Belarus and Ukraine, training on SEA in Belarus and in Armenia);
- (g) Further savings are foreseen for informal translations of submissions (\$10,000), for promotional materials (\$30,000), and are also expected for informal translations of informal papers (up to \$30,000);
- (h) Finally, savings are foreseen for the organization of workshops and half-day seminars.
- 17. Some spending on priority-2 workplan activities may exceed the assigned amount for a budget line:
- (a) The total costs of the meetings of the Implementation Committee may exceed the budgeted amount, further to the Bureau's decision that funds should be identified to cover the costs of one additional, ninth, Committee meeting in the intersessional period (only eight meetings had been budgeted).
- (b) Though the total costs of financial support for participation at the meetings of the Working Group were below the budget, the costs of participation by representatives of

countries with economies in transition and slightly also that of representatives of non-governmental organizations to the third meeting exceeded the budgeted amount. This was due to the decision by the Working Group to extend is third meeting by half-a-day which entailed the costs of an additional DSA for all the participants that benefited from financial support.

18. Table 2 presents the budgetary requirements for the period between the fifth and sixth sessions of the Meeting of the Parties, identifying how much of the budget has been fulfilled by expenditure and in-kind contributions and taking into account savings and overspend. Table 2 refers to priority-1 and -2 activities as only these had a budgetary allocation.

V. Outstanding requirements and operating reserve

- 19. Table 2 also presents the outstanding budgetary requirements at the end of the period, totalling \$323,638 for priority-1 and -2 activities. These requirements may be contrasted with the available funds for such activities, totalling \$254,443, and the outstanding pledged contributions of \$78,761. Without the important expected savings (\$360,191) and additional unpledged contributions by a few Parties in the reporting period, the difference between the outstanding budgetary requirements and the expected resources available, i.e. the shortfall for the budget, would have been substantial. The failure of some Parties to pay the remaining pledged contributions would lead to a shortfall, which would need to be addressed through further savings and additional contributions if the workplan is to be completed.
- 20. An operating reserve of \$411,925 was created by carrying forward unspent funds from the two periods between the third and fourth, and the fourth and fifth sessions of the

Meeting of the Parties, as decided by the Meeting of the Parties at the respective sessions. The operating reserve provided contingency funding to ensure continued operations under the Convention in the event of unanticipated problems, for example delayed receipt of contributions.
