UNICEF WORK ON MHM IN KYRGYZSTAN

- To assess knowledge, attitudes, and practices around menstruation
- To identify the primary challenges to menstrual hygiene management (MHM) for schoolgirls in Kyrgyzstan
- To seek possible solutions to increase puberty and menstruation knowledge among adolescents and provide an enabling environment for MHM in schools
- Advocacy for improved WASH in Schools for girls.

MHM formative research: Tools & participants

- The formative research employed qualitative research methods
- 39 research activities with 200 participants conducted
- FGD with girls aged 12-16, boys aged 12-16, mothers and fathers of adolescent girls.
- In-depth interviews conducted with adolescent girls and Key informant interviews with school staff.
- WASH facility observation at research schools.
- Validation activities conducted at schools after the initial data collection and preliminary analysis.

Key research findings in Kyrgyzstan

DETERMINANTS

Insufficient knowledge and support

Inadequate school WASH facilities and software

CHALLENGES

- Fear of menarche
- Reluctance to seek support
- Poor MHM understanding
- Irregular menstruation
- Pain and weakness
- Masking health concerns
- Leaks and stains
- Odor
- Inability to change and wash at school
- Teasing and embarrassment

IMPACTS

- Missed class times
- Withholding urination
- Stress
- Distraction
- Self-exclusion
- Reduced participation at physical activities

RISKS


- Anemia
- Missed education opportunities
- Infections
