1 Background information

1.1 What is the Liaison Partnership?

The Liaison Partnership was formed in 2005, because of concern about the future management of Newborough Dunes and Forest. The partnership includes about 50 people who represent local residents, local and voluntary groups, as well as organisations such as the Newborough Community Council, Forestry Commission, the Countryside Council for Wales and Anglesey Council. The Partnership has always been open to all individuals who have an interest in the site and its management.

The Partnership agreed an initial aim, which was:

"to work together with all those interested in the design, management and use of the Newborough Forest and Warren Area to enhance its environmental, social and economic value in the long term"

One of the important tasks for the partnership was to gather and present views which would help shape a new Forest Design Plan for Newborough Forest. It was also keen to look at other issues and ideas that would be relevant to the management of the wider site in future.

The Partnership built on views gathered in the public consultations held during 2004. Task and Finish Groups have been set up to look at issues and ideas under different themes: Habitats and Species, Community Involvement and Strengthening Partnerships; Recreation and Access; Economics.

These groups, and the Liaison Partnership as a whole, have explored many ideas and have gathered additional information to help influence the future management of the Newborough dunes and Forest. However, more work needs to be done in future on some issues.

The members of the Partnership are keeping other people informed through face-to-face updates, press releases, information on the notice boards and in folders left in local post offices. The Forestry Commission website includes full details of the Partnership's activities and discussions.

1.2 Why did the Liaison Partnership hold a consultation in summer/Autumn 2006?

In winter 2006, the Liaison Partnership intends to present a set of recommendations to the various organisations that are responsible for drawing up plans and programmes of work for Newborough warren, beach and forest. It will ask these organisations to take these recommendations on board when planning the future management of these areas.

The Partnership believes it is important that people who have an interest in the Newborough forest and warren – whether they are local residents or visitors - have a chance to consider these recommendations, and to add their views.

1.3 What did the consultation involve

The partnership came up with a full set of recommendations which was made available on the website and in local shops in the area. A 'full' questionnaire and newsletter were sent in August 2006 to

- all residents in Rhosyr Ward
- all who left their contact details in the last round of consultation
- all key fob holders

They were also

- available in the post office and PJ Institute
- available from the Forestry Commission Wales website
- handed out at the Newborough Festival on 17th September.

To reach as many people as possible, and to raise interest in the future of the Forest and Warren, a festival was held by the Partnership on the 17th September 2006. In addition to a range of activities, a 'short' questionnaire and children's versions of the questionnaire were handed out alongside the longer version.

1.4 How many took part


Approximately 500 people attended the festival on 17th September 2006.

A total of **448** questionnaires were returned, of which 18 were short or children's questionnaires and 430 were long (full) questionnaires. The Liaison Partnership was very pleased with the number of responses, and by the number of people prepared to spend the time completing the long questionnaire.


1.5 How many had given views before

People returning a short questionnaire were asked whether they had given views on the Newborough forest/warren before? Of the 18 short questionnaire responses. 7 had not given any views before. Of those that had, 2 had given views at consultation exhibitions / meetings, 1 through the liaison partnership, and 7 in other ways. This does seem to indicate that the consultation was reaching more widely than the earlier consultations.

1.8 What will happen next?

The Liaison Partnership recommendations will be considered by Forestry Commission Wales and the Countryside Council for Wales and will be turned into a draft set of guidance for the Forest Design Plan. This will be presented back to the Liaison Partnership in January 2007 for their views. The draft Forest Design Plan, and any other plans will be presented and consulted on in March and a series of drop in sessions held in Newborough.

2 Information from the short questionnaires

18 people (mostly young people) returned a short questionnaire. These were available at the Festival. This section records what they said:

2.1 How often do people go to the Forest and Warren?

People returning a short questionnaire were asked how often they go to the Newborough Forest or Warren. Of the 18 people who returned these questionnaires, most said 'most days' (8 people). Five said about once a month, two said in holidays, two said occasionally and one said once a week. This indicates that a good proportion of those responding to the short questionnaire at least, were locally based.

2.2 What do they do in the Forest and Warren?

2.4 What people think will most improve the area

Those completing a short questionnaire were asked: "If you were 'in charge' of the area, what three things would you do to improve the forest and warren for people and wildlife?"

Their answers give an indication of what those 'new' to the discussion would have to say without being 'prompted'. What the 18 people returning these questionnaires said was:

- I think the warren should be made accessible from the beach car park with a circular walk. It could link up with the path running through the dunes already.
- A visitor center could educate the general public. Information needs to be provided so that people don't tramp all over the place disturbing wildlife and damaging flora.
- The forest and warren already provide a haven for wildlife and the public. To much felling would have an adverse effect as has been in the past when the cross bills habitat was destroyed and the Ravens were disturbed from their roosts.
- Improve the habitat for red squirrels

- Provide waste bins in Warren car parks and top car parks in forest.
- More signs on Warren and Forest encouraging people to take their rubbish home
- Place information and help station in Forest Car Park.
- Left as natural as possible.
- Information on Walks etc.
- Horse hire
- Ice cream van
- Painting here all the time
- · A slide in to the water
- Trees on the Warren
 - A wall to stop you getting washed out to sea.




- Visitor Centre/Education Centre.
- Make more paths, but stop people in large 4x4 trying and succeeding in entering the forest also motor bikes.
- Organize information days for group outings.
- More Police presence in both areas i.e. car parks.
- A visitor center, it would be a sustainable long term project it would employ 1 or 2 local people it would keep vandalism down, encourage knowledge and learning about the area and through selling information trinkets i.e. postcards biros and shirts it might make some money for the Area. There would be E.U. grants for such a project because of its sustainability.

3 Overall views on proposals from the liaison partnership

People completing the full questionnaire were asked: taken as a whole, how would you rate the recommendations from the Liaison Partnership, as ways of improving the area? Of those that replied to the question (400 of the 430 people who returned a questionnaire), the vast majority rated the recommendations quite highly:





Comments

- I feel Newborough Forest/Warren is one of very few unspoilt places left, if tourists want ice creams etc there are other places they can go, the Island should be kept clear of Boats, Jet Skis, etc. The only thing needed is to put up signs to warn people they could get cut off by the tide on the Island.
- Whilst I agree that the Forest and Warren should be available to all, I think that only
 development of certain areas such as Llanddwyn would spoil the peace and charm.
 Having known the Forest area since the 1950's it is hard to think of it being over
 developed and over populated.
- Under a regime of climate change and uncertain funding / policy, the priority should be
 to provide 'wildlife opportunity'., which should not be jeopardized by unsympathetic
 development e.g. for access or tourism, or by any undue weight being given to any one
 aspect at the expense of others. Score might be different if the question said
 'managing' rather than 'improving'. I am, in principle, not in favour of
 recommendations that imply development to 'improve' the visitor experience beyond
 quiet enjoyment, which people should be able to find there for themselves already.
- Include re-cycle bins in the car park by the old toilet block, eliminating the rubbish build up. Needs more local feedback and general meetings with locals views given and noted.
- Who?, When?, Funding?
- Due to recent trouble with my eye sight I am unable to do any writing which can be illegible at times. Reading has become a burden and writing worse still. I wish you all success in the enquiry.
- Don't understand this. It strikes me that the lower the human input/presence, the better the area will fare. Those wishing to protect the area will be the best guardians for it's future. (Greed should not dictate any policy). I like the idea of consultation but who ultimately decides the future direction? and in whose interests. I would dislike watching Newborough become just another spoilt beach
- A worthwhile scheme which deserves the support of all who use this wonderful site, well done.
- Hidden Agenda
- A forest already is! Garbled and unclear
- Green initiatives need to be introduced slowly

- The regeneration of felled areas is essential as bare areas are rather an eyesore.

 Dangerous unsafe trees should be felled. We would hate to see a natural beauty spot like the Warren spoilt. This would soon happen by opening beech cafes and over patronisation, also notice boards dotted around. Horse riders should be designated to areas where people will not be walking. Definitely no motorbikes or quadbikes.
- Just leave it all as it is.
- Newborough Warren is a beautiful area and it would be hard to improve on, apart from, sadly, a little more security so that it can remain that way.
- What does this mean? Pleased to see that an initiative has been undertaken
- Not sure what it means but it sounds good.
- Explain climate change etc and how to reduce impact Interpretive centre focused on marine conservation and present species on sea shore and in the sea. Encourage local schools etc. Collect and develop local sustainable food sources e.g. Samphire, Cockles, Mussels, sell locally Kelp and Carageenan. This area could develop into North Wales top attraction holiday, economic, recreation, education, camping, caravanning locally, high potential.
- As a beach/key fob holder we tend to avoid the area on bank holidays or some summer weekends as the car park is full, an alternative car park near Malltraeth would allow the opportunity to explore the other side of the forest at busy times instead of avoiding it altogether at peak times. We parked on one occasion at the bird reserve, but had the unfortunate chance of robbery out of the boot taken, therefore secure parking is necessary.
- Would like to be more informed before making a decision.
- Section D I found to be to difficult to understand. I believe the questions need to be simplified.
- Wheelchair access <u>must</u> be a priority both to the forest and the beach and the car park! Perhaps a unique car park for disabled locals (outside of Newborough) and also for visitors to the area. That would certainly encourage more visitors. As suggested in Page 2
- I reserve judgement until we see what you are actually going to decide on.
- About time why delay? It has been greatly underestimated the value of the Forest as a recreational site whose wildlife and flora attract many visitors and island residents throughout the year and in all weathers. This goodwill could make the site and the Warren into a "National Treasure". The family beach, peace and quiet must be protected for future generations all it needs in Vision!! Some room for debate but at least public opinion has been sought no more secret plans please. The Forest and Warren belong to the Nation not CCW and Forestry or Newborough.
- No matter what changes take place the main priority should always be to maintain the Natural Beauty of the place and to protect the habitats and wildlife there. People visit the site, the wildlife have to live there. It is essential not to damage the Habitat of the wildlife. Good ideas, anything that improves an area is fine. The thing about Llanddwyn and Newborough is that those places are magnificent. To improve on them needs careful planning and thought, financially and locally. I live on Merseyside. If the beach on Llanddwyn got messed up because of Winter weather etc, then if organised I would join up with others to tidy the beach on winter Sundays in New Year January etc.
- Mainly no changes required.
- Every chance should be taken to maintain what we have at Niwbwrch. It must be protected and enjoyed.
- Don't try to do too much!!
- OK but want t see a definite commitment to keeping the forest and not returning it to duneland habitat.

- Very good if in place, however, it's the general public who need educating. And rules abided and respected.
- The Forest landscape needs the problem of bramble in particular to be addressed. I know it is beneficial to a lot of species but there is just to much of it. The same applies to Cotoneauter to a lesser degree. We never got round to discussing the bramble issue in the Habitats and Species meetings. We ran out of time. There is a need for more mixed planting even though deciduous trees are on the increase in the Forest. The shelter provided by the trees should be retained with forest glades in the forest itself to provide even more diverse habitat for the numerous species that inhabit this beautiful peaceful place.
- Remember what the majority want PEACE and |???? And please don't leave it to the ????????, and proceed VERY CAREFULLY IF THE OSPREYS CHOOSE TO NEST IN THE FOREST! (Adult present JUNE-SEPT 06 plus another Sep 06
- Not sure what this entails for working in Forest.
- I am a regular visitor to Newborough Forest and Warren but would ask WHY I, and other near neighbours received 2 of these forms (each postage being 41p) This unnecessary postage could be used for better purposes.
- Mixed in some respects.
- Need to thrash out with others debate/pros/cons/etc. You don't need me do you?
- I agree that attracting tourists is a good thing, but it has to be tempered habitat is a fragile thing and would be endangered if too much disturbance occurred.
- Some additional development would improve all but priority must be to keep Llanddwyn Island as special as it is now.
- Give Wardens the ability to enforce rules, e.g. radios, Police Back Up etc. No tolerance policy to litter and dog fouling, issue mountain bikes to wardens.
- Any effort to improve this area naturally without introducing commercial ventures is welcomed.
- Costal erosion should be looked at a matter of urgency in my view, as we are regular users of the area, be it forest or beach, we have noticed a vast destruction of the Coastal landscape by the elements between Ynys Llanddwyn Causeway and the main car park especially.
- Plant deciduous trees where possible or variety of pine trees
- Depending upon what building work took place
- Why cant it stay as a Beauty Spot? Why does it have to be a money making business firstly and a natural habitat second?
- I don't understand enough to comment on jargon
- Get rid of the forest. The forest was planted Post War destroying the traditional dune system. It is an ugly blot on the landscape and should be drastically cut down and removed. As a painter living in Malltraeth that forest is a dark alien streak in the Landscape. More glades, lakes, lots more dunes less people, more wild life varied plant life. Not a managed activity area but a wild, windswept Nature Reserve!
- What about an exercise trail through the forest (like continental ones fixed equipment and boards with instructions)
- Allow nature to take it's course you may be surprised! If there is a new set of dunes forming 200-700 yds out? As result of ??? Dredging a seabed disruption?
- The whole area has a natural creative beauty which is very special and certainly unique to Anglesey. Café's, BBQ areas spoil the environment. Careful management of the forest with new planting schemes is needed, with wildlife protection critical.

- The unique combination of habitats that make up Newborough need to be protected.

 With careful management this can be done whilst allowing/encouraging greater access and use of the site by both locals and tourists.
- I dislike the recommendations that commercialise Llanddwyn. It is a very precious site and should be kept as it is.
- What is that? Thousands of people come to Llanddwyn and now our grandchildren, the do not understand why you want to turn it into a sort of Park. The idea of boats I agree you must raise money to employ locals you would then get people who used to come, they were the ones that buy thing and eat in the cafes. You seem to have made up your mind what you want to do why do you think you can do ???? do leaflets, its all been done before, does not need investigating.
- At the moment the litter bins are not being emptied enough. This is the largest improvement that would take the least cost in the village!
- The aim of Improving car park facilities has failed in Penlon.. Despite the vast amount of money spent (wasted) we can stat that no one uses the so called picnic area it is just an eyesore, for us residents who live adjacent to this so called car park money could have been spent better within the Community. Visitors now have to park on the lane and on verges.
- Would like to know more before agreeing
- Maintenance of the forest is essential but removal of trees without replanting the same area would be a tragedy. Continue the Red Squirrel project.
- Doubtful of its contribution to reduce the CO2 content of the atmosphere There is far too much emphasis on tourism and forestry to the detriment of the natural landscape and wildlife, both fauna and flora of the area. There are more than enough coniferous forests and tourist hot spots in North Wales without creating another hot spot in Newborough. Natural unspoilt sand dunes areas are scarce and many have suffered from afforestation and tourism in the past. A high proportion of Newborough and surrounding are population at present are new comers who firmly believe that the forest has always existed. They are the ones who seem to rule the roost and one in favour of retaining the forest, while the indigenous inhabitants prefer the pre existing sand dunes without a single tree. A habitat for terns, chaffs, skylarks, lap wings, partridges, curlew etc and none wild flowers are far more important then footpaths and bridleways for visitors to ride their horses, and for dog owners toilet their dogs foul paths and beaches. Improvement of public access to existing coastal paths, as well as establishing new routes is already part of WA6 Strategy, so probably our views are irrelevant.
- Half the forest should be managed as a natural reserve and the existing pathways should be maintained in order for walks etc. Also the road from the car park to residents car park should be re-tarmaced all the way. I understand the need for proposals but I do hope that the residents in the village will stick together to prevent further loss of the trees from our forest.
- A friend who has a Doctorate in Geology from London University did field trips to Newborough during her studies many years ago. Is this still encouraged? She thought it was an Amazing place.
- · What is a 'Carbon Sink'
- The balance should always be in favour of the Natural Habitat people come second.
- Leave it alone, no chemical spraying of 'weeds' keep it all organic.
- I don't know how the forest is best managed.
- See previous comments. I think there is a real risk of spoiling what is there through over development.

- Awareness of the forest and growth of tourism can become apparent to 'Authorities'
 when the proposal to implement out of date proposals for "thinning" came out in 2005.
 The growth of visitors over the past five years now means it is almost unpleasant for
 locals to visit the Warren and Forest other than "out of season". What was a local
 unspoilt area is now becoming a commercial undertaking managed for the benefit of
 anybody else other than residents.
- People visit Llanddwyn for what it is an area of outstanding natural beauty a place to go to get away from all the man made recreations and commercialism it would be shameful to violate that.
- To reduce climate change.
- I am opposed to any commercialisation, and would like to see a more mixed ?? Habitat, with a greater emphasis on the dunes.
- Maintain the forest as predominantly Pine (Corsican, Scots, Lodgepole) to maintain diversity of woodland on Anglesey to benefit specific fauna and flora (Red Squirrel, Crossbill, Siskin, Redpoll, ???? And fungi)
- Am delighted to have a chance to see and react to these proposals. Please ensure that subsequent developments and actions are made public, showing how clearly ???? The results of this survey.
- Plant more, may be native species What is the aim in terms of wildlife what species
 are you trying to maintain in proposal and why? Needs clear direction to help with the
 decision making.
- Very encouraging, I think that any development that will help the environment and make the area more user friendly will be great.
- Sounds like fine words!
- I do hope the forest can be managed to preserve the wildness and natural beauty without having Beach cafes, ice cream vans etc!
- We mainly agree with the proposals, but don't understand some points.
- I do not know what the recommendations are as they do not seem to be easily available. These questions all seemed to be loaded but by nod having the knowledge of recommendations I am unable to see the wood for the trees!!
- the forest is a wonderful place but it MUST pay its way hopefully without spoiling it
- the area is a natural beauty spot and should not be developed and commercialised
- It is heartwarming to learn how sympathetically the whole question of managing the area is being considered, I feel most content and optimistic about future developments
- I very much enjoyed and appreciated the chance to use the forest minibus, I have known the forest for many years but have been unable to walk it for the last decade. I am impressed by its new beauty. The ??? Of trees enabling grass and plants to grow on the lightened forest floor and the glades have made it truly magnificent, well done to you all
- we look forward to enjoying this area even more
- I would like to see the area left as natural unspoilt region, we do not need cafes, large signs or gaudy information boards, any development will ruin the magic of Llanddwyn, there are too many visitors here already
- I have resided on Anglesey since 1947, I am shocked to think of such a beautiful venue being commercialized and spoiled, this island Llanddwyn is a famous place and much loved and treasured by so many. Please continue to respect its beauty and tranquility
- to be a human being we must be a human doing, taking into account the number of people at the beach especially at weekends/bank holidays is there adequate first aid facility available? The delay of ambulance negotiating forest road could be vital. Although the forest is beautiful/amazing at present it would be even better if areas of

- deciduous varied trees creating a woodland glades encouraging a wider diversity of plants and wildlife and offering better/easier access through forest
- very well thought out the recommendations are practical and realistic and well considered, things have to change and every year there are increasing amounts of people visiting this area and I feel now is the time to get things going!
- not competent to comment, have serious misgivings about the whole tone of questionnaire which we fear will change what we believe is the attraction of the area to us who have enjoyed the many aspects of flora and fauna of the area over the larger part of a lifetime.
- mainly these matters should be left to professionals who will not always get it right but make fewer mistakes than amateurs
- full marks for asking our opinion but pointless to ask our overall opinion as some questions are very suspect in nature & others are good ideas.
- develop and exploit the very important archaeological sites in and around the forest, in particular Cae Llys
- <u>LET WELL ALONE!</u>. It looks as if plans to align the shoreline and have more dunes is coming through the Back Door!
- Newborough Forest as a Red Squirrel reserve would offer great socio-economic benefits and could accommodate most of the partnership recommendations.
- Not an effective option as area too small and theories of carbon fixing are sketchy.
- How will these proposals affect the plan of a thermal Power Station rooted to be built on the site providing local residential heating (thus reducing burning fossil fuels) and providing a renewable energy source.
- Prioritise protection of habitats above provision management of Warren ???? Increased numbers of visitors is always risky in wild and secret places - seems very important therefore to ensure that improved access does not intrude too far (however that's defined) and the balance is achieved. Appreciate difficulties and complexity re protection, promotion and balanced development.
- Llanddwyn is enjoyed mostly as it is, but needs to be tidied up. I care for Llanddwyn.
- Good up to now but more detailed information required for a number of proposals before a decision could be made.
- Any potential for creating a large, or series of small lakes offer some controlled felling?
- Well done most sound really good would enhance the reserve and local area appropriately.
- MIXED VIEWS As carbon is stored in young trees in greater quantities felling deciduous may be altered in a way that negatively impacts other concerns
- Would strongly support a scientific monitoring programme of recording species, geology
 and environmental changes over time as I believe most effective wildlife management
 relies on an understanding of dynamics against stability. Liaison partnership had
 addended areas concerning * Social issues local, tourist and varied interests,
 education., * Business tree crops, visitor centre etc, * Environment ecology,
 sustainability. Difficult to please everyone but discussion and information appears to
 be important to the group.
- Certainly topical and ??initiating for the future
- Overall management of the area is, I think a good idea, but what that entails is the question. I don't know enough about it to comment fully. Introducing Flora/Fauna to the area which are sympathetic to the Forest/Land. As a local resident I love this natural reserve and hope that it is managed properly for future generations. As well as being of benefit for current users. Over management, visitors centre etc are all very well but in my opinion tend to focus on money making schemes which are not always

to the long term benefit of the Forest/Beach. I understand that money is needed for the up-keep of this resource, however my instinct is to do as little as possible to maintain the 'Status Quo' - after all it was there long before 'Forest Management' and will be there long after. Raise fees by all means - people should pay toward the cost of up-keep.

- I am very keen to support the area but the development must be sensitive so as not to spoil the area's natural beauty. I would also support encouraging local employment and responsibility of the area. I do not think that we have to attract more visitors we already have enough passing through the village.
- Why not remove and replant external edges of forest which have suffered from wind and salt with deciduous (or other conifers) which could withstand extreme conditions.?
 With care, planning, and great deal of thought about how to enhance educate and develop prospects for local children and teenagers with a view to attaining awards, standards and possibly qualifications in education, outdoor activities, swimming, sailing (renew seafaring tradition of Newborough!) - linked two schools and Colleges. I do not wish my name and address to be divulged.
- Gradually replace fir trees by deciduous naturally occurring trees.
- For this you will need trees.
- The forest should not be reduced in size, the warren is large enough especially when you take into account neighbouring Warrens. The area is unique on the Island, if it is allowed to become too commercialised, it is us, the Tax Payers who will loose out.
- See that there are plenty of things for Children parents to take part keep forest tidy
 no litter and learn all about the natural side, provide food for picnics a little from each so some not able to provide are looked after and encourage to take part.
- Why is there a proposal that forest glades said to provide <u>good</u> habitat for wildlife etc should <u>NOT</u> be allowed to regenerate? Why is this classed as improving 'landscape', geology and wildlife? The proposals involve many issues, many of which are quite complex so I think greater explanations are required in order to obtain well informed opinions.
- When tree felling has occurred large areas of Brambles are now present preventing access off the paths. I thought alternative tree planting was planned.
- As always it is a fine balance between maintaining the natural aspects of the site and
 making it available to the public for their enjoyment and education. Apologies for what
 may appear to be many negative comments but my main concern relates to securing
 the positive and on going commitment of the local community as a whole. I find it very
 sad that such a beautiful Area with matters of interest to a wide range of people had
 deteriorated over recent years.
- Although I live in Stoke-on-Trent, I am a frequent visitor to Newborough and have a
 Key Fob Pass. I would stop in the village if there was more attraction. The programme
 restoration spot lighted a building I'd never heard of. The beauty of Newborough for
 me is it's isolation don't change it too much it has character.
- Development of the forest is a good idea my real concern is that Llanddwyn Island would be further developed. This would be a shame as it would feel even less like a natural wild place.
- Newborough is probably one of the most naturally beautiful areas I have ever been to.
 There is no doubt that residents of Newborough should be able to benefit from the forest in a financial sense, but please don't commercialise it!
- Still needs more of a management presence and education centre for visitors, people need to be made aware of the initiatives. Could establish "Newborough Env Society" charge for membership with free entry to Warren/dunes. People feel ownership especially locals. Help educate young children and bring local schools to visitor centre (Primary/Secondary)
