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Transport, a Strategic Factor for Economic Development

- Basic for trade and tourism
- Job creator
- Key to social well-being, social cohesion
- Transport sector 10% of GDP



Transport Challenges

- Inadequate transport infrastructures
- Bottlenecks and missing links
- Lack of funds
- Legislation, taxes and charges
- Cumbersome and time consuming border procedures
- Solutions require intergovernmental cooperation



About UNECE

- Regional branch of the United Nations
- 56 States Members, Neutral, Pan-European, Trans-Atlantic, Euro-Asian
- Forum for intergovernmental cooperation in economic areas, including Inland Transport
- UNECE, Pioneer in international cooperation on inland transport
- The Inland Transport Committee, in cooperation with the EC and all stakeholders, including NGOs



UNECE Conventions and Agreements

- 56 International Agreements and Conventions
- Legally binding, UN Procedures
- Constantly updated, brought in line with EC
- Applied by many countries worldwide
- European legacy to international Community
- Elaborated by consensus
- Open to all UN Member States
- Many non-ECE States are already Parties

Coherent Transport Infrastructure Networks

- European Agreement on Main International Traffic Arteries (AGR) of 1975
- European Agreement on Main International Railway Lines (AGC) of 1985
- European Agreement on Important International Combined Transport Lines and Related Installations (AGTC), of 1991
- European Agreement on Main Inland Waterways of International Importance (AGN), of 1996

To provide legal framework for construction and development of coherent international road, rail, inland waterways and combined transport networks E networks



Road Traffic Safety,

- Convention on Road Safety, of 1968
- Convention on Road Signs and Signals, of 1968
- European Agreement supplementing the 1968 Convention on Road Traffic







Provide a set of international agreed road traffic regulations aimed at the improvement of the efficiency and safety of international road traffic



Safe and Clean Vehicles

- Vehicles Regulation, 1958
- Global Vehicles Regulation, 1998
- Technical Inspection of Vehicles, 1997



Uniform technical prescriptions for vehicles, equipments and parts and conditions for reciprocal recognition of approvals granted



Simple Border Crossing Procedures

- TIR Convention
- Harmonization of frontier controls



- Temporary importation of Commercial road vehicles
- Temporary importation of private vehicles
- On containers and pool containers
- Customs facilities for touring



To facilitate the international carriage of goods and passengers across borders



Transport Facilitation and efficiency

- CMR and its protocol
- Perishable foodstuffs (ATP)
- Dangerous goods (ADR) and its protocol
- Work of crews (AETR)



To facilitate international carriage of goods and passengers, increase safety of international road transport, prevent professional drivers from driving excessive hours



About Implementation

- International Conventions on transport facilitation can yield substantial benefits
- For this to happen, they must be fully and effectively implemented
- The ECE has neither enforcement authority nor financial means for implementation
- Implementation is the responsibility of Contracting Parties

ECE Promotes accession and implementation, provides technical assistance and advise, monitors implementation (whenever possible)



Planning Tools

- E-road Traffic Censuses, every 5 years
- E-rail Traffic Censuses: first in 2005
- Terminology on Combined Transport by UNECE, EC and ECMT
- Electronic database on AGR, AGC, AGN, AGTC Agreements


- UNECE TEM and TER Projects

- UNECE-UNESCAP Euro-Asian Transport Linkages Project




Euro-Asian Transport Links Project

- Joint ECE-ESCAP work with UNDA funds
- Part of a UN global project on developing interregional transport linkages (2003-2007)
- 18 countries involved
- Main Euro-Asian transport links identified
- 230 Projects evaluated and prioritized 43 bill.\$
- Border crossing issues addressed









Euro-Asian Transport Links Next Steps

- EATL Project has been found useful
- Much work remains to be done and for long time - momentum should be maintained
- Project funds will end in 2007
- Ensuring continuation as from 2008 is essential
