




A growing number of environmental measures notified to the WTO...





... by both developed and developing countries



... reflecting the close links between trade and environmental policies




A unique forum for policy dialogue: The WTO Committee on Trade and Environment (CTE)



Supports WTO members in:

- Understanding the links between trade and environmental policies
- Learning from national experiences
- Enhancing the positive interaction between trade and the environment and avoiding green protectionism

The CTE: Recent areas of work



Selected issues raised in the CTE on IUU fishing



- Traceability: permitting, reporting and recordkeeping requirements; catch certification schemes
- Fishing vessel registration, fishing authorization, vessel monitoring systems
- National and international law, including Port State Measures Agreement
- Economic incentives (subsidies)

Selected issues raised in the CTE on illegal logging

Illegal logging

- Legality verification systems; "due diligence", recordkeeping requirements for operators
- Certification and labelling schemes
- Sustainable forest management; economic opportunities, including of non-wood forest products
- Bilateral and international cooperation and partnerships

Selected issues raised in the CTE on organics and other sustainability criteria

- Organics
- Standards (including carbon and water "footprinting"), harmonization, data quality issues (life cycle analysis)
- Labelling and conformity assessment procedures
- "Connectivity" to local and international markets, including specific barriers facing small producers
- Legal framework, stakeholder participation, capacity building

Selected issues raised in the CTE on waste and hazardous chemicals

Waste

- Illegal traffic; permitting, notification and tracking systems, prohibitions
- Chemicals management plans and risk management measures, challenges
- <u>E-waste</u>: policy framework; development of management systems, facilities; economic opportunities
