Note by the secretariat

Summary

The Meeting of the Parties to the Convention on Environmental Impact Assessment in a Transboundary Context and the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Protocol on Strategic Environmental Assessment requested the Convention secretariat, in accordance with the financial rules of the United Nations, to monitor the expenditure of the Convention's funds and to prepare a report for the next sessions of the Meetings of the Parties, based on the information contained in biannual reports (ECE/MP.EIA/15, V/10–I/10, para. 14). This report covers the period from after the fifth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention, in June 2011, to mid-March 2014, and includes estimated expenditure up to and including the sixth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention in June 2014. The trust fund balance was positive at the end of the period.

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The Meetings of the Parties are invited to consider the information and take it into account in their deliberations on budgetary matters.

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I. Introduction

1. This report sets out income, in-kind contributions and expenditure regarding the Convention on Environmental Impact Assessment in a Transboundary Context (Espoo Convention) and its Protocol on Strategic Environmental Assessment (Protocol on SEA) from the fifth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention, in June 2011, to mid-March 2014, and includes estimated expenditure up to and including the sixth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention in June 2014, as well as the balance in the Convention's trust fund at the end of the period. It also identifies savings and overspend. Details of income and expenditure are provided in the annex to this report.

II. Pledges and fundraising

2. The pledges made at the fifth session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention (MOP) were insufficient to cover the budget of the Convention and the Protocol for the period up to the sixth session of the MOP and the second session of the Meeting of the Parties to the Convention serving as the Meeting of the Parties to the Protocol (MOP/MOP),¹ representing only less than 50 per cent of that budget. The Parties were therefore invited to come forward with further contributions, noting also that the Meetings of the Parties had encouraged: (a) Parties that had up till then not pledged anything to make contributions during the current and future budget cycles; and (b) Parties that had up till then only committed limited funds or in-kind contributions to raise their contributions during the current and future budget cycles.²

3. The Chair of the Bureau wrote to a number of Parties in March 2012 and again in May 2013 for this purpose. Some Parties made unpledged contributions in the reporting period, including subsequent to the letter from the Chair. In particular, Norway contributed over seven times more than its initial pledge. Finland funded an associate expert to support the secretariat for the entire intersessional period (and in total for four consecutive years).

4. It is expected that all countries will have fulfilled their pledges for the intersessional period. At the time of writing, in mid-March 2014, outstanding pledged contributions for 2014 from Croatia and Hungary were still under way.

III. Income and expenditure

5. Table 1 summarizes the income and expenditure in United States dollars. Parties made financial contributions to the Convention's trust fund (annex, tables A.1 and A.2).

6. Activities under the workplan³ were assigned priorities 1 or 2 in the budget of the Convention and the Protocol, while other activities, not explicitly listed in the workplan or not expected to be covered by the budget, were considered priority 3. Pledged and non-earmarked contributions were only to be used to fund activities with priorities 1 or 2.

7. Some countries imposed conditions on their contributions, notably by earmarking them for priority-2 activities and especially to support participation in meetings by representatives of countries with economies in transition (CITs). Switzerland made funds available for technical advice to Uzbekistan, as foreseen in the workplan but not expected

to be covered by the budget of the Convention and the Protocol (therefore assigned priority 3). Sweden and Switzerland provided funds for activities not listed in the workplan but implied in the declaration by the first session of the MOP/MOP; these activities were also assigned priority 3. Switzerland made a contribution to cover practical costs of a side event at the Seventh “Environment for Europe” (EfE) Ministerial Conference, held in Astana in September 2011, whereas Sweden’s contribution was intended to enable the secretariat to support the ratification of the Convention by the Russian Federation. Germany made funds available for the workshop on public participation held jointly with the Convention on Access to Information, Public Participation in Decision-making and Access to Justice in Environmental Matters (Aarhus Convention) in October 2012, as foreseen in the workplan but not expected to be covered by the core budget (therefore assigned priority 3). It also funded the preparation of the draft good practice recommendations on public participation in strategic environmental assessment (not explicitly listed in the workplan, therefore assigned priority 3).

8. One priority-2 activity was not completed within the previous intersessional period and was therefore carried forward, together with its budgeted funds (\$22,600): a subregional cooperation workshop for the Mediterranean Sea.

9. The income, together with the funds for the carried-over activity, totalled \$970,973.

10. The secretariat spent from the trust fund in accordance with the budget (table A.3, with further details in tables A.5 and A.6). The funds were spent on the two priority-1 activities, namely on an external expert to provide secretariat support and on drafting of the

reviews of implementation of the Convention and the Protocol. Funds were also spent on priority-2 activities in the following areas:

- (a) The sixth session of the MOP and the second session of the MOP/MOP;
- (b) Nine sessions of the Implementation Committee;
- (c) Three free-standing meetings of the Bureau;
- (d) A meeting of the chairs of the bureaux of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (ECE) conventions and the Committee on Environmental Policy (as there was no fourth meeting of the Bureau);
- (e) Three meetings of the Working Group on Environmental Impact Assessment and Strategic Environmental Assessment;
- (f) Informal translation of informal papers for the above meetings;
- (g) General guidance on enhancing consistency between the Convention and environmental impact assessment within State ecological expertise in countries of Eastern Europe, the Caucasus and Central Asia;
- (h) Secretariat travel in relation to the workplan;
- (i) The promotion of contacts with countries outside the region.

11. In addition, the secretariat spent from the trust fund further to the earmarked contributions by:

- (a) Sweden and Switzerland, on the side event to the Astana EfE Ministerial Conference and to support the ratification of the Convention by the Russian Federation;
- (b) Germany, on the joint workshop on public participation with the Aarhus Convention, and the preparation of draft good practice recommendations on public participation in strategic environmental assessment by a consultant;
- (c) Switzerland, on technical support to Uzbekistan to review its national legislation for the implementation of the Convention and to propose amendments.

12. The expenditure totalled \$750,335, to which was added 13 per cent United Nations programme support costs of \$97,544, leaving a balance in the trust fund of \$123,094.

13. Parties, other States and organizations also undertook or financed the following priority-3 workplan activities in the following areas by providing in-kind contributions (table A.7):

- (a) Financial support of a speaker at the side event to the Astana Ministerial Conference;
- (b) Subregional cooperation meetings in Poland and Estonia for the countries of the Baltic Sea area;
- (c) A four-day workshop to strengthen capacity for the development of environmental impact assessment (EIA) and strategic environmental assessment (SEA) systems in Uzbekistan, with sharing of experiences from other countries in the implementation of the Espoo Convention and in particular its Protocol;
- (d) A pilot project between Belarus and Ukraine, 2013–2014;
- (e) Technical advice and training on SEA in Belarus;
- (f) A workshop including training on SEA in Armenia;
- (g) A workshop including training in Ukraine;

- (h) Development of legislation on SEA in the Republic of Moldova;
- (i) Seminars for the exchange of good practices on biodiversity and on wind and hydro-energy, and a workshop on the long-range impacts of nuclear energy-related activities.

14. Funds raised through the Environment and Security Initiative (ENVSEC) (with funding from Sweden) were disbursed to support the technical advice and training on SEA in Belarus and the pilot on post-project analysis of transboundary EIA between Belarus and Ukraine. These funds also supported organization of a subregional seminar to present the results of the pilot project in April 2014 (total value \$210,000).

15. The Swiss funding for pre-accession support to Uzbekistan in drafting legislation for the implementation of the Convention was supplemented by funds made available by the German Agency for International Cooperation (GIZ) (total value \$8,000).

16. Starting from 2013, the funds raised through the European Union-funded Greening Economies in the European Union's Eastern Neighbourhood (EaP GREEN) programme generated a substantial increase in income (totalling €2 million for 2013–2017, with \$422,626 made available for 2013). This created savings in the use of the trust fund and allowed implementation of workplan activities in Armenia, the Republic of Moldova and Ukraine. In addition, these funds covered legislative assistance for the implementation of the Convention in Georgia (not listed in the workplan but requested by Georgia); as well as the costs of one full-time external expert and one administrative support staff on a 50 per cent basis to support the secretariat in planning and management of capacity-building activities.⁴

17. The above workplan activities, funded by in-kind contributions, have been valued at \$358,000 in total.

IV. Overspending and savings

18. Savings, at or exceeding \$10,000 per budget line, were realized for the following:

- (a) Expenditure for an external expert to provide secretariat support, owing to the fact that during the reporting period the post of the external expert was vacant for several months (saving \$53,417);⁵

- (b) The staff shortage over an extended period limited the travel of the secretariat, which generated further savings (saving \$70,344);

- (c) Promotion of contacts with countries outside the ECE region was carried out at reduced cost (saving \$21,584);

- (d) Savings of \$30,000 arose from the Bureau's decision not to fund participation of non-ECE countries in the meetings of the Working Group in 2012 and 2013;

- (e) During the intersessional period, the Implementation Committee did not recommend the conduct of country-specific performance reviews to assist Parties to

strengthen their implementation of and compliance with the Convention and the Protocol (savings for the cancelled activities of \$75,000);

(f) Further to its fundraising from other sources, the secretariat could finance workplan activities without using the trust fund, which resulted in savings for costs of consultants (saving \$48,498: e.g., for the pre-accession legislative support to Belarus and the Republic of Moldova; a pilot transboundary EIA between Belarus and Ukraine; and training on SEA in Armenia, Belarus and Ukraine);

(g) Further savings included those for informal translations of submissions (\$10,000), promotional materials (\$30,000) and for informal translations of informal papers (saving \$55,000);

(h) Finally, savings were realized for the organization of the workshops or half-day seminars within the meetings of the Working Group, which were mainly covered by in-kind contributions (saving \$30,000).

19. Some spending on priority-2 workplan activities exceeded the assigned amount for a budget line:

(a) Though the total costs of financial support for participation at the meetings of the Working Group were below the budget, the costs of participation by representatives of CITs and slightly also by representatives of non-governmental organizations (NGOs) to the Working Group's third meeting exceeded the budgeted amount. This was due to the decision by the Working Group to extend its third meeting by half a day, which entailed additional daily subsistence allowance (DSA) costs for all the participants that benefited from financial support;

(b) Though the total costs of the meetings of the Bureau were below the budget, the costs of the freestanding meeting of the Bureau in 2014 exceeded the budgeted amount, due to the need for the secretariat to arrange for simultaneous interpretation.

20. Table 2 presents the budgetary requirements for the period between the fifth and sixth sessions of the MOP, identifying how much of the budget was fulfilled by expenditure and in-kind contributions and taking into account savings and overspend. Table 2 refers to priority-1 and -2 activities as only these had a budgetary allocation.

V. Outstanding requirements and operating reserve

20. Table 2 also presents the outstanding budgetary requirements at the end of the period, corresponding to the subregional cooperation workshop for the Mediterranean Sea area, which was not held as planned. This requires that \$22,600 be carried forward into the next intersessional period, taking into account the United Nations programme support costs. The remainder of the \$123,094 in the trust fund (table 1) may therefore be added to the operating reserve once final expenditure figures are available.

21. An operating reserve of \$411,925 was created by carrying forward unspent funds from the two periods between the third and fourth, and the fourth and fifth sessions of the MOP, as decided by the MOP at the respective sessions. The operating reserve provided contingency funding to ensure continued operations under the Convention in the event of unanticipated problems, for example delayed receipt of contributions.
