



Unmet need for family planning (2017)



Change in adolescent fertility rate between 1995 and 2015








Man drowning in a river that was, on average, only three feet deep





Performance monitoring



analysed available data in six key areas: reproductive health, maternal health, violence against women, comprehensive



Percentage of the population that would not like to have people who have AIDS as neighbours




Percentage of the population that thinks homosexuality is never justifiable



