The workshop will be held in the Palais des Nations, starting at 10:00 Geneva, Switzerland, 8-9 December 2003

#### I. BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE OF THE WORKSHOP

In view of the upcoming World Summit on the Information Society in Geneva (10-12 December 2003) and the Declaration of Principles and Plan of Action that will result, there will be a need to monitor the progress made towards the goals stated in Geneva (2003) by the next Summit in Tunis (2005) and beyond. In light of this, it is fundamental that Information and Communication Technology (ICT) data be brought into the realm of official statistics, so that current global gaps in the data can be identified and closed.

- 2. The first step in making this happen is a fundamental stock-taking exercise. This workshop will comprise a variety of themes surrounding ICTs, including (i) the role of ICTs in economic and societal transformations, (ii) individual and household use of ICTs, (iii) business usage of ICTs, and (iv) measuring social implications of ICTs (see preliminary programme attached to this information notice). Within each theme, some basic questions will be asked. Can critical data or indicators that currently do not exist but are desirable be identified? Are these even measurable? How is it possible to encourage countries that don't currently collect the relevant data to do so within their official statistics programmes?
- 3. The main participants of the Workshop will be representatives from national statistical offices, policy makers and analysts in the ICT area. The key message of the Workshop will be the need for official statistics to be a central player in shaping the information society from the point of view of (i) independent information as a basic condition for democracy and other aspects of the UN Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics, and (ii) statistical monitoring with the view to obtain international benchmarking and to assess ICT trends from a core set of internationally agreed indicators.
- 4. Each session of the Workshop will produce conclusions and recommendations concerning what has been done up to now, how it was done and how we go from here. They will also include discussions on relevant ICT indicators and have suggestions for internationally agreed core sets of indicators at the closing session of the Workshop. The closing session will also summarize the previous seven sessions and thereafter agree on conclusions and recommendations of the Workshop. These conclusions will be brought to the attention of the World Summit on the Information Society.
- 5. Other important issues to be addressed by the Workshop will include: (i) statistical capacity building bringing ICT statistics into the realm of official statistics; (ii) classification issues; (iii) harmonizing data; (iv) importance of household surveys; (v) importance of having a centralized place for knowledge and data from each of the organizations; and (v) data priorities, including a possible suggestion of basic indicators (a minimum list) that countries should collect to aid international comparisons.

#### II. ORGANIZERS

6. The Workshop is organized jointly by the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE), United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), International Telecommunication Union (ITU), UNESCO Institute for Statistics (UIS), Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) and the Statistical Office of the European Communities (Eurostat).

#### III. PARTICIPATION AND ACCREDIDATION

7. Representatives of all Member States of the United Nations and of interested intergovernmental organizations are welcome to participate in the meeting. Representatives

of non-governmental organizations in a consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council may also attend. All participants attending the meeting are requested to have a valid passport and, if required, a visa. Applications for visas should be made as soon as possible to the Embassy of Switzerland in the country in which the participants reside, with reference to the joint UNECE/UNCTAD/UIS/ITU/OECD/Eurostat Workshop on Monitoring the Information Society.

- 8. Representatives from national statistical offices, government agencies and other relevant offices, and international organizations who wish to participate should complete the attached registration form and return it to the UNECE secretariat.
- 9. Participants in the Workshop are expected to arrange financial support for the participation themselves as well as to make their own travel and accommodation arrangements.

#### IV. DOCUMENTATION, METHODS OF WORK AND OFFICIAL LANGUAGES

- 10. The working languages of the Workshop are English, French and Russian and most likely also Arabic, Chinese and Spanish. The documentation for the Workshop will consist of information notices, keynote papers, supporting papers and background documentation supplied by countries and organizations. Documents may be submitted in any of the official languages of the UNECE (English, French, Russian) and most probably also in Arabic, Chinese and Spanish (this will be confirmed at a later stage on the UNECE web page as indicated below). Translation will be made of keynote papers provided that they are submitted before **25 September 2003**. Supporting papers, which will be made available in the original language only, should be submitted before **25 November 2003**.
- 11. Simultaneous interpretation for the languages mentioned above will be available.
- 12. For each session there will be a discussant and 2-3 speakers presenting invited papers. All other participants are welcome to submit a supporting paper to any of the sessions. The supporting papers will be distributed to the delegates. They will be summarized by the discussants and the issues raised in them will also be discussed.

16. Information and communications technologies (ICTs) are having a profound impact on the functioning of the economy, as well as on people's lives. In addition, the link of ICTs to economic development has generated all kinds of questions. Statistical measurements are indispensable for an informed understanding of the implications of all transformations underway.

- 17. This session will explore what needs to be measured, why and how. It will present an overview of the work that has been done so far and it will outline what lies ahead. In addition, it will underscore the particular importance of internationally harmonized concepts, definitions and indicators in this area. Particular emphasis will be placed on the significance of the ICT sector and the macro impacts of ICTs on aggregate measures, particularly productivity. The importance of the access to and the actual use of ICTs by people will also be assessed (Digital Divide). The need for a framework that would guide measurements for international comparability will be stressed and a list of indicators will be suggested.

- 18. The rapid and widespread penetration of ICTs, particularly of the Internet, among businesses continues to change the way business is conducted. With the digital economy growing, the role of ICTs in general and e-commerce in particular is receiving increasing attention in national strategies of competitiveness and economic development.
- 19. This session will present statistical measurements of ICT usage among enterprises that have been undertaken to date by statistical offices and international forums, including recent experiences in measuring e-commerce. The scope, methodology, challenges and results obtained from such efforts will be clearly addressed and their analytical usefulness will be highlighted. Moreover, the issue of how national information needs in this area are met in conjunction with the need for international comparability of statistics will be discussed.

- 20. Recognizing the important role of ICT for development and economic growth, an increasing number of developing countries are directing their attention towards developing national ICT strategies. In this context, monitoring and evaluating the developments of the digital economy has become a key element of national ICT policy making.
- 21. This session will present experiences, efforts under way and prospects for the measurement of business use of ICTs and e-commerce in developing countries. ICT-induced changes in the global economy will be linked to country-specific contexts. The critical aspects of capacity building and knowledge generation, transmission and absorption will be addressed. Furthermore, the coordination of initiatives will be discussed with the aim of arriving at a roadmap that would help bridge severe informational gaps at the international level. The session will also make suggestions for concrete activities that could be carried out in this area before the second meeting of the WSIS in Tunis in 2005.

- 22. Access to ICTs is the condition for people to benefit from services available in electronic form. Surveys of ICT usage by individuals and households, standardised by OECD and Eurostat, have passed the piloting phase and are being extended to ever more countries.
- 23. The theme of this session is measuring access to ICTs by individuals and households. Results from recent surveys in Europe will be presented, with reference to the underlying policy needs. The scope is then widened to the globe, tying the indicators into the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDG) and bringing into the picture a case from outside Europe. 26. ICTs have far-reaching implications not just for economic sectors, but also for societies as a whole. The uses of ICTs have extended into the everyday lives of many but not all around the globe. There is a widely held view that access to and use of ICTs should be viewed as a means towards the improvement of quality of life, and not be considered an end

into itself. Thus, it is important to explore the ways in which the use of ICTs can benefit the disadvantaged and advantaged of the world alike, and to measure the related impacts.

- 27. This session will explore a variety of topics such as the use and benefits of ICTs in the field of education, as well as issues of access to and exclusion from ICTs in general, with particular emphasis on gender. Within each theme, the current statistics and indicators that are available will be identified, as well as those that are desired but don't currently exist. The barriers that prevent such data collections from taking place, such as conceptual problems, competing priorities, lack of resources, and the need for capacity building, will be discussed, along with suggested remedial actions.




