Standard for Citrus Fruit

Comments by South Africa

The Specialized Section will revisit the marking provisions of the Standard on the basis of the following proposal submitted by the delegation of South Africa.

Motivation for new wording:

*1. Under certain circumstances when Clementines are marketed as Mandarins or Tangerines, e.g. when the market does not differentiate between Mandarin varieties, or when seed content exceeds acceptable levels for the UK, then these varieties can still be marketed under the generic term "Mandarins" or "Tangerines". The reasoning for this is that both Satsumas and Clementines are a type of mandarin. Note that the opposite is not intended, i.e. it is not intended to market Nova as "Clementine".

*3A. In many markets, it is important that a mandarin-hybrid can be marketed as "Mandarin" if so desired. The reasoning for this is that other mandarin-hybrids, e.g. Sonet, Kiyomi, Primosole, etc., are also a type of mandarin. Note that there is already provision for this in clause 3.

*3B. The use of new or unusual variety names, e.g. Sonet, can be confusing in certain markets. Therefore, it is important that a mandarin-hybrid can be marketed as "Mandarin" if so desired. Note that there is already provision for this in clause 3.
